EDITORIAL

So here we are into summer with gardens blossoming and the rain keeping everything green. Read on for news and views from the village and surrounding area.

WILLAND PARISH COUNCIL CHAIR - COMMENT & REPORT

The A.G.M of the Parish Council has taken place and I still find myself in the Chair. We did not have an election for the Parish Council as there were only ten people who put their names forward by the due date. At the first session of Full Council I had the pleasure of welcoming two new councillors, Karen Whatley and Stephen Little, it was also a pleasure to welcome back Simon Dilke-Wing. At the June full council meeting Bill Tobin was co-opted back on to the Parish Council to fill the remaining seat.

The Inspector has now published his findings into the Local Plan and the headlines in the press were mainly about the proposed inclusion of land at Junction 27. The full response is on the MDDC website and it bears close reading. The deliverability of the 5 year land supply is still an issue and the inspector made some suggestions as to possible alternatives. If you read the small print you will see that Willand is likely to catch a lot more houses but no mention of better infrastructure or facilities. The problem of the capacity of Junction 28 and the Cullompton Town Centre Relief Road come into the picture. Press reports about millions of pounds from Government to pay for the relief road and work at Tiverton also needs the detail looking at. It looks as if MDDC will 'borrow' 5 million pounds towards the cost of providing the Cullompton Town Centre Relief Road.

The Orchard Way play area is now under the control of the Parish Council and will benefit from more regular grass cutting. It is still the intention to put a major piece of play equipment in there. A bid has been submitted to the Big Lottery Fund for £10,000 but that takes time, even if we are successful. A bid has been made to our local DCC councillor for some money from his locality budget and a local company has offered to put up the final quarter of the cost when we have raised the rest. I would like to think that there are some of our larger companies in or close to the village who would feel able to find £500 or a £1,000 to help towards the total cost of the project for the benefit of the community.

The Jubilee Field and its equipment is still being well used and the young people who are interested in riding their bikes around the track have worked with Councillor Jason Scott to make improvements to the facility. Having worked to create it they will hopefully appreciate and look after it as opposed to having something just provided by others. It is for the benefit of all, so big lads please let the little ones have a go and help them. We are a community after all. The track is becoming an attraction to some lads from nearby villages and they are welcome as long as they respect the facility. You will have noted that some more seating is appearing in response to requests made to the Parish Council. For those of you who watch how we spend your pennies I am happy to tell you

that your councillors obtained nearly all the cost from grants. Please look after them – that's the councillors as well as the seats. Two areas of fencing have been repaired/replaced as the result of damage – it costs us all.

Grass, weeds, hedges and shrubs are growing apace. The contractors are cutting verges and play areas which are looked after by the Parish. The Parish have had the weeds in pavements sprayed and they will be done again later in the year. Will everyone please do their bit to keep growth from their hedges and gardens cut back to keep the pavements clear and to their full width. Thanks to another excellent discount on the price of plants by The Old Well our volunteers have changed the planting in the planters and troughs. Thank you volunteers for your work and to all who do their bit to keep the village tidy.

The preschool and community rooms at the Gables site are moving forward and the Parish Council are releasing funds held to Willand Health & Community Centre Charity to progress the project. The Trustees will tell you more of what is going on.

As the result of the recent election for MDDC I now have another hat to wear as one of your Ward Councillors. Many thanks to all those who voted for me and helped me with getting leaflets and information out. I shall be working alongside Richard Chesterton and Bob Evans, and although our politics may vary, I am sure we will do our best to represent the residents and businesses of Lower Culm [*basically Uffculme and Willand*.] If you have a problem, please contact us. If it is to report a problem, please use MDDC Customer First and they will give you a reference number. Hopefully the problem will be resolved or if not an officer will make contact with you and explain. If the matter is not dealt with or explained that is the time to come to us. If you are in any doubt we are here.

Finally, but no less important, dog mess. We still have a few inconsiderate dog owners who do not clear up after their little darlings - or very big ones if evidence around the school gate in the Jubilee Field is anything to go by. Thank you to all the volunteers with the bag dispensers and pink spray and particularly those who clear up after others. To those who are putting their household rubbish in the various litter bins around the village – please stop we know who some of you are and it could be costly to you if it is taken further.

Weeds are welcome but can we ask that as much soil as possible is removed as the operators of the shredding machine will refuse to put material with too much soil attached through the shredder as it can damage the cutters.

During opening times, we are available to provide assistance. We can loan a wheelbarrow if required please return it.

WILLAND HISTORY GROUP

Firstly, we would like to thank Geraldine 'Geri' Holloway for writing to the History Group in response to our last article. Regarding the Second World War US reconnaissance aircraft base at Bradfield, she wrote: "I have vivid childhood memories of cycling to the back drive of Bradfield House from Carr Cottage in the 1940s to gaze in wonder at three or four small aircraft lined up in single file on the grass 'runway' several yards from the security fencing behind which curious spectators like myself stood. Alas, I never witnessed any of the 'planes either taking off or landing!"

Geri also gave us invaluable information about Willand's orchards, and even about one of the apple varieties that used to be grown in the parish: "I can also recall many orchards, most of them belonging to Reg Rowe, in the vicinity of the 'old village', all of which I am sure are well documented. At least two of them – one in Silver Street between Willand Café and the Gables, the other one halfway down School Hill on the right hand side, presumably belonging to Coombe Farm, and fronting on to the main road – displayed huge WHITEWAY CIDER signs. I know from personal experience that Ernest Vickery of Quicks Farm made his own 'rough' cider.

"There is one orchard, however, which may not be so obviously recorded, known simply by my family and its owner as 'The Orchard'. It was quite small and belonged to Harry Mortimore, the village postman, who lived with his wife at Ivy Cottage adjoining my home, Carr Cottage. His orchard was accessed by a small gate at the end of his back garden path and also by a much wider gate halfway down the left hand side of Dye House Lane, a gate wide enough for my father's car to pass through to and from its 'garage' in a large barn-like building in the orchard itself. My father rented the 'garage' from Mr Mortimore. Mr Mortimore kept quite a lot of hens (and a vicious cockerel) which roamed freely throughout the orchard which was dotted with several apple trees of both cooking and eating varieties. I remember particularly one of the latter known to us as Plumvite – a delicious juicy yellow apple with a very pleasant tang. I suspect 'Plumvite' was not its correct name because no-one else ever seems to have heard of it!" Geri was quite right, Plum Vite is a variety of apple that originated in Devon.

At the time of writing, the History Group plan a small display on Revd Andrews in the Church for the Open Gardens weekend (15/16 June). Revd Andrews was Willand's rector between the wars, but the display will focus on his time as a missionary in China during the early 1900s. However, an article in *The Devon* & *Somerset News* has recently been found detailing a bicycle accident he had whilst cycling from Exeter to Willand in May 1920. It was on Pinhoe Hill and Revd Andrews, "was descending the gradient, free-wheeling at a fair speed, when he met three other cyclists who were ascending the hill. The one nearest him could not turn to the left in time to avoid Mr Andrews, as his companions were in the way. A collision resulted, and Mr Andrews sustained a cut (with some loss of blood) under the ear." The dazed and wounded Revd Andrews continued his journey on the back of a 'sheep cart', until a passing motorcar was hailed, and he was taken home to Willand, after first visiting a doctor in Cullompton. Quite sensibly, the doctor, "ordered a week's rest and quietness."

Revd Andrews had been a central figure in the village's Peace Day celebration 100 years ago, on 19 July 1919 – a national holiday to commemorate the peace that came with the end of the First World War. Typically, after three long months of drought conditions, the day was marked by 'ceaseless rain'. The planned sports day was postponed, as was a skittling competition for a 'leg of mutton', but otherwise the day's events went ahead in Willand. There was a service at the Church, a procession, a 'bountiful tea' in the Pavilion (opposite the Halfway House), patriotic songs were sung, and a 'baby show' was won by the child of Mrs Jarrett of Bradfield Lodge. As reported in the local press, "A dance followed, at the end of which a large number of villagers went to the top of Stonestall Hill to see the bonfires, 'balloons', rockets, etc., in the district around. A long-to-be-remembered sight awaited them."

The rearranged sports were held a few days later. Mr D Marshall took home the leg of mutton for winning the skittles, while William Rowe won a cockerel for coming second. But the highlight of the day proved to be the tug-of-war competitions, especially the 'Parson v. Blacksmith' contest which received top billing. There was much 'amusement' when Revd Andrews emerged victorious, defeating Mr Clist, the village blacksmith, 'after a hard struggle'.

The Elections were disappointing in a couple of aspects firstly our ward saw a turnout of only 31% disappointing given the size and complexity of some of the issues we face, unfortunately low turnout was a theme throughout the district and the shadow of National politics saw a huge change in representation throughout the district throwing us into a council of no overall control, an interesting time lies ahead.

Here we are already getting back to business as usual, a meeting was held with 2 Sisters management on the 10th of May, several areas of concern were discussed, these included night time noise and the all too familiar odour issue, some good news is that the new management do seem to want to work with us and much promised funding for onsite air scrubbers to be installed has now been secured, works to take place later in the year, noise issues are dealt with as they occur and again I urge all to report any issues to the incident line on 0800 807060, or you can of course report through myself or any of your District councillors, all contact details on the MDDC website .

The dog mess issue has seen a relocation of one bin from Willand Old Village

to Willand Moor Road at the request of the Parish Council, this was done to facilitate dog walkers in that area.

Despite the fact the Willand has a huge number of bins for its size, some 31, people still think it's OK to not pick up their mess, or and forgive me I don't get this one, on a recent estates inspection with an MDDC Officer I saw bags of dog mess hung in private hedging in the village ??? So, you took a bag you picked the mess up but hung it in a hedge, really?

A final point on local bins, I have received reports that some bins are being used by residents to place their domestic rubbish into, fair warning is I have reported this to our refuse teams and MDDC will through our policy's and processes investigate and follow up where possible, please don't, this could be costly to you !

I do try and relate some useful information to assist residents and the following relates to the ability to seek a reduction in your council tax should you or a relative / friend suffer from a recognised Severe Mental impairment (SMI)

Information regarding the disabled banding reduction is given on the back of the bills we issue. The bill also provides Mid Devon's website address which provides information regarding the SMI Disregard as well as the disabled banding reduction, online application forms are available directly below the information to make the application process as simple as possible. The Citizens Advice Bureaus, Shelter, Age UK etc are all aware of these potential reductions and it is hoped that they direct customers to apply.

The issue with the SMI disregard is that the customer as well as having to provide a doctor's letter will need to be in receipt of a qualifying benefit to get the disregard and will not qualify without it.

MDDC would be obliged to backdate 6 years if we can establish the circumstances going back would have qualified the customer at the time.

I've provided a website address below, a search on this will give residents a link to their local council, another avenue for application.

VOLUNTEER TO HELP IMPROVE AND SHAPE LOCAL HEALTH SERVICES The Royal Devon and Exeter NHS Foundation Trust (RD&E) is calling for interested members of the public to give some of their time to support the NHS locally by putting their names forward to be elected as a Governor.

The elections are carried out on a non-party political basis.

As a group, the role of Governors is to:

- represent the interests and views of local people and feed these back to the Board
- hold the Non-Executive Directors to account for the performance of the Trust's Board
- approve the appointment of Non-Executive Directors and the Chair
- reflect information about the Trust back to the communities it serves.

James Brent, RD&E Chairman, said: "Governors play a hugely important role at the RD&E, and across the NHS. The NHS faces challenging times ahead and our Governors will continue to play a pivotal part in ensuring the voices of the communities we serve are truly represented. We therefore strongly encourage people, from a range of different backgrounds, to consider putting themselves forward to take part in the 2019 RD&E Governor elections".

Peta Foxall, Lead Governor, said, "Being a Governor at the RD&E is very rewarding and is well supported by RD&E staff. It is an enjoyable voluntary role that enables the Governors to work together to ensure that the voice of the patient and the community is properly represented right at the heart of the RD&E. Standing for election is important because that gives you a mandate to speak on behalf of the people you represent."

She added, "We are really proud of the fact that, as a group of Governors, we have had significant influence in improving services delivered by the RD&E over time." Governor roles at the RD&E are non-paid, voluntary positions (although expenses are paid). The RD&E will be holding two Prospective Governor Meetings and three "meet a governor" drop-in sessions for those who are interested in serving their NHS and making a difference. But true Champions find a way; they don't lie down in the face of adversity and 2 minutes after being reduced to 10 men, Luke Alden popped up with a sublime finish to gain parity.

The news of our equaliser rumbled up the M5 to where Parkway were playing and they seemed to crumble under the pressure, conceding 2 goals to draw 3 all. Bitton however, if they won they would finish second so piled on the pressure. But the 10 men of Willand stood firm and secured that all important point that secured the league title.

So from 2019 Willand will be playing sides from Swindon, Winchester, Southampton, Forest of Dean, Thatcham and Portsmouth etc.

Jenny Mitchell and Cath Dinner jointly won the club person of the year award. Flowers were presented to an invaluable support of the club – our ladies who do so much behind the scenes without true recognition, Tracey Greening, Sonia Hurst, Mel Barrs, Caroline Dummett, Celia Force and Wendy Frost.

Lee Waterman of Willand Service Centre presented Brett Worbey with a boot voucher after he was deemed to be our most valuable player week in week out. Joe Curtis finished a close second behind him.

Local firm **Pickerings Hire** have come on board as a new sponsor this year sponsoring the new treatment room that we are required to have for the Southern League.

This is a number of changes that we need to compete at the next level, other ongoing works include infilling the pitch surrounding, creating outside toilet facilities and providing an additional seating area. Work has progress throughout the summer with a gang of us there every Saturday pottering around getting these tasks all done.
