WILLAND PARISH COUNCIL CHAIR - COMMENT & REPORT

Autumn is here and life is moving on at a pace which will bring some changes to our village but hopefully we will embrace them and get on with life for the benefit of all.

The Planning Inspector has allowed the appeal for the outline planning permission for 125 houses off Meadow Park. This is going to be about 100 more houses in the village on top of what was planned over the next five years or so. A full planning application will now have to be submitted and approved for what is called 'reserved matters'. This will include full details of drainage, road layout, house layout and design, materials to be used and many other things. Once the full details of the application are available everyone will have the opportunity to comment and support or object to the details. The Parish Council has already put in a request, with the support of the three District Councillors, to Mid Devon District Council, to look at putting Tree Protection orders on the main trees in and around the site which are part of our landscape. In granting the appeal the Inspector has put numerous conditions on the development and he has also included guite generous payments to be made to the Primary School, Parish Council and WHCC to provide facilities within the village to assist with accommodating the additional residents. Part of the footpath along the main road (B3181) opposite the new house should also be widened. Sadly by the time we get it no doubt everything will cost that much more to provide!

The Big Lottery Fund has made us a grant of the maximum of £10,000 towards the cost of providing a major piece of play equipment in the Orchard Way Play Area. [I do not feel so bad now when I see I have won nothing on my lottery ticket.] We also received a grant of £1,000 from Devon County Council Locality Budget courtesy of Councillor Ray Radford. We then had a very pleasant and welcome surprise when Nicci Gratwicke, the Owner of PenCarrie Ltd., a major employer in the village, heard of the project and offered to top up the fund with the final £5,000. The order has been placed and it will hopefully be installed by the end of the year. It very much depends on when we can get into the construction and fitting program. Our thanks go out to all who have contributed and made this possible.

The Bus Shelter for South View Road has been ordered and will be erected when the groundwork team has a slot in their schedule. Once again this is to be provided by the generosity and public-spirited actions of PenCarrie Ltd.

It has come about as the result of Nicci's personal suggestion and the Parish Council has just worked in liaison with DCC to help make it happen. PenCarrie Ltd. is seeing to everything and there is no cost to the Parish. Thank you once again Nicci.

Phase 2 of the Mid Devon Business Park is to go ahead with access from the Four Cross Way Roundabout and through the existing Business site. Due to considerable local objections to the proposed enlargement of Hitchcocks Farm Business Park the owners are looking to scale down the size of the extension but there may be a loss of some of the proposed footpaths and other amenities.

The 'Phantom Hole Digger of Willand' is still at work in the Jubilee Field and this is costing you money to put it right. We have some evidence that metal detectorists are at work so if you see them please ask them to stop. We are in the process of looking to replace some of the older equipment in the fenced play area and to repair/replace the safety surface. This is going to be major financial commitment so any fundraising idea/donations will be willingly received.

Your Parish Council are now in the process of putting the budget together for next year which will set the precept for the Parish section of the Council Tax. Quotations are being sought for cutting the grass verges, cutting the grass and hedges in the play areas the Parish looks after and the grass and hedge cutting in the cemetery. We have to be aware of inflation and the possibility of the minimum wage rising. With the extra work and legal requirements falling on the Parish Councils we will also have to get some administrative help for the Clerk. Anyone with ideas, opinions or thoughts are asked to pass them onto the Clerk please – it would be appreciated if abusive comments, if you have any, are kept to yourself as we are all doing the best we can for our community.

John Holmes, our litter picker, and his team of helpers will have replanted the planters around the village for the winter and spring and once again the plants have been provided by The Old Well Garden Centre at a generous discount. Thank you to John and his volunteers and to the Compost Team and Sylvia from the allotments for providing the compost to refresh the ground.

Some members of the Parish Council, under the stewardship of Councillor Stephen Little, have started looking at putting together a Neighbourhood Plan which will hopefully set out the future development of the village, and perhaps surrounding area. This is a long and legal process but work will expand to encourage the involvement of the whole community so watch this space. The Parish Council and your Ward Councillors are involved in submissions to the Boundary Commission over the future Boundaries of areas and numbers of councillors for future representation of you at various levels of local and national government. Nothing to do with Brexit – honest – the outcome of this exercise must have a deal!

Work is going on at all levels at this time of year to cut back hedges, clear footpaths and drains and other areas of maintenance. You can help by firstly making sure that your own hedges, shrubs and gardens are not encroaching onto pavements and footpaths. If you see somewhere has been missed and you cannot sort it yourself, please report it to the appropriate Council. Please do not leave it for someone else to do as if we all adopt that position nothing will get done.

You cannot fail but notice there is growing concern and action to slow down climate change. MDDC Environment Policy Development Group, of which I am Chair, has been tasked with putting together and recommending policies and actions within MDDC. This will dovetail in with work being done by DCC and Exeter University. As more information comes to light our Group will be looking to engage and work with likeminded people and groups within the community. Many villages and towns already have such groups who are putting ideas forward. I am not aware of such a group within Willand but if there is please make contact with the Clerk. Despite many rumours we will not be recommending banning the use of cars, heating, mobile phones and tablets. I suggested such measures to my grandchildren and I think their parents are still dealing with their trauma. Seriously folks we do need to look at some serious changes now and for the future.

The shops are beginning to put up their Christmas displays so as this magazine covering December will be falling through your letter box way before Christmas may I take this opportunity to wish you all an early, but none the less, very Happy and Peaceful Christmas. COMPOSTING MATTERS

LEAVES.

The first method to deal with leaves instead of raking is to mow the leaves (mower to have collector) then cover your soil (flower beds/vegetable plot) with the mowed leaves. This will add nutrients to the soil.

Alternatively, we accept **DRY** leaves. Please deposit in the nominated bay - nearest to the main gate. Your co-operation is appreciated.

GARDEN WASTE.

Please continue to deposit ONLY that which we accept (see signage).

Particularly, Grass Cuttings need to be fresh and not left to be rotted in bags/wheelie bins.

SHREDDINGS - FREE

All garden waste is shredded and deposited in a separate bin. Over time this is mixed with grass cuttings and/or leaves as part of composting. Currently the volume of shredding's is greater than we can compost. To create room, we are offering Shredding's for **FREE**; we are informed that allotment holders and those with large gardens benefit from shredding's being rotavated or dug into the ground this brings on better growth.

CHRISTMAS TREES – we accept

Providing they have no decorations; baubles and the branches are no more than 1" in diameter.

WILLAND HISTORY GROUP

The History Group has little to report so far as our own activities are concerned, but would like to promote an event at Willand Church Hall, Rectory Close, on Thursday, 14 November, from 2.30-4.00pm, when Charles Scott-Fox will be giving a talk on the 'History of Imprisonments in Exeter'. Everyone is welcome, and it promises to be really interesting.

A couple of curious articles have recently surfaced from the Archive. One was published in the *Devon & Somerset News* 16 October 1919 and concerns a Willand Men's Club temperance meeting at which a Dr Robert Simpson of

Plymouth lectured on 'the scientific aspect of the temperance question' with the intention of proving that alcohol is injurious to human beings. There were around 30 men present, and one of them said that, "First we were shown the effects of alcohol on vegetable life, then its effects on the lower forms of life, tadpoles and chickens, and finally on the human brain. Photos and diagrams showing the result of scientific experiments proved that the functional activities of the brain are weakened by even moderate doses of alcohol. He contended therefore that his argument for total abstinence was unassailable."

Fifteen years later, an unrelated article appeared in the *Devon & Somerset News* on 31 May 1934 under the headline of 'CAR VERSES COW', but the reality of the incident was not so amusing as this suggests. Soon after midday on the previous Tuesday two bullocks belonging to Mr Edwards of Woodcoxhayes emerged from a lane leading from Park Farm at Tiverton Junction (where Stoneman Engineering now is, on Station Road). Just at that moment Mrs Fowke (the wife of a bank manager), travelling in her 'light motor car' from the Halberton direction collided with one of the bullocks 'and carried it a considerable distance. Mrs Fowke's son was catapulted against the windscreen. The cow's injuries were such that it was considered advisable to shoot it immediately'. The sad act was carried out by Henry Eveleigh of Park Farm in the yard of the Railway Hotel (located under what is now the M5 Motorway), but to make things worse 'The radiator of the car was completely wrecked, and the Triplex windscreen was "starred" all over.'
