#### WILLAND PARISH COUNCIL CHAIR - COMMENT & REPORT

We have had the election and so we have some idea as to how we go forward. Brexit is being sorted – well over the next, who knows, how many years! In the interim life goes on in Willand. The Christmas lights have been and gone – thank you again to all the generous businesses and other organisations who contributed towards them.

We still have the inconsiderate parking at school drop off and pick up times; inconsiderate dog owners who do not clear up after their pets {a minority thank goodness}; fly tipping, particularly around Dean Hill Road; and a few idiots who persist in damaging areas and equipment provided for the benefit of the community as a whole. We still seem to have a fair share of potholes and bad bits of road — I could go on! Please be vigilant and report any incidents you witness to the appropriate authorities but if you have a problem in doing so please tell the Clerk. On the other hand the bulk of us manage to look after where we live and my thanks go to those who cut back brambles and other vegetation growing out over footpaths and particular thanks goes to the gentlemen who sorted out the mud and leaves on the footpath along the main road near to Ash Close. What a pity we cannot get Live West to sort out their

builder who caused the subsidence in the pavement by Rowan Lea which means that the children going to and from school invariably have to walk through water or mud.

Moving forward we can report that the Precept for the next financial year has been set and as far as the Parish Council is concerned the rise is below the average elsewhere. A separate article elsewhere in the magazine sets out the detail. The team looking at a Neighbourhood Plan is making progress and have also reported elsewhere in these pages. We welcome a new Parish Councillor in Ryan Hayman and his business experience should help add another dimension to the Council.

The Boundary Commission has put out their ideas for consultation. They have not listened to the Parish Councils or Ward Members and are still leaving Halberton responsible for half of the business park and the new houses on the edge of Uffculme. We Ward Councillors appear to be going to inherit part of Kentisbeare instead. Not sure where that came from as it took us all by surprise. Please do submit your views more information is available on the Parish Website or via the Clerk.

Planning applications are in the pipeline, one being for the 24 gas burning generators for top up electricity to be next to the Biogas plant which is still awaiting the decision on the application to increase the tonnage of feedstock it can take on the site. Whilst preparing a response it was interesting to read the following "Anaerobic digestion can have up to 25 times greater global warming potential than carbon dioxide, and the biogas produced is highly flammable and explosive requiring robust safety measures to be in place." Not my words but those of Devon County Council Public Health quoting from a 2019 comprehensive review. Hitchcock Farm is expanding but not quite as much as originally thought although we will not now get the hoped for footpaths from the village to the site. We have not heard any more about the 125 houses off Meadow Park but the Parish Council has put in a request to MDDC for the trees on the site to be made the subject of Tree Protection Orders in the hope that they will nor mysteriously disappear over a weekend like happened on the Halberton bit of the Business Park Phase 2.

At the time of writing there has not been any response to our representations to try and save the Chestnut Drive Play Area. Thank you to those who responded to the letter which was circulated. Work is in hand to see about replacing some of the tired equipment and the safety surfacing in the fenced area of the Jubilee Field for the little ones. Any-one with any ideas for improvements to our open spaces and play areas are asked to share them with us via the Clerk. Tarmacking over the Jubilee Field to make more car parking for parents picking up after school is not an option!!!! Let us keep working together to look after our village, and where we can make it better. Remember it is better to give than to receive. My grandchildren have trouble with that one when it comes to money. Keep smiling. Barry Warren Chair Willand Parish Council

#### **BOB EVANS MDDC Councillor Lower Culm**

Well here we are already well into 2020 the Easter Eggs are out (have been for ages) many sat on shelves next to Christmas stock, can't be right, or is that just me getting older?

As every other year Mid Devon continue to try to provide a wide range of services and balance budgets, unfortunately it's a bit like juggling water at the moment and decisions are already being made to scrap several discretionary services and I fear these are just the start, watch for press releases and check the MDDC web pages for updates.

#### Climate crisis

Many readers will know that Mid Devon Council joined other authorities when they declared a climate crisis and agreed to do all we can to ensure Mid Devon is Carbon Neutral by 2030, an enormous task but one that gained unanimous support from all councillors. I was interviewed by Radio Devon as they took an interest in my Motion on tree planting that was unanimously passed by full council the second week in January, the idea is not unique and follows on from the examples of community projects such as the Tiverton tree team, I have asked Mid Devon officers to identify land that is within our ownership that we cannot develop and instead of letting it just sit there plant some suitable trees on it, did you know that on average a tree will remove 40kg of carbon a year, they also look good and are the home to many animals and insects, bit of a winwin I thought? I have also contacted some local land owners asking if they have any land that they would be willing to plant trees on, it's not the total answer I know but it helps. Do you have any land you would be willing to consider planting trees on? Or do you know somebody that does?

I have also put a further two motions forward on how we as an authority work with developers on how houses are built and how we put power to them, I understand developers will resist anything that effects their bottom line but we must do everything reasonable to both reduce and mitigate carbon issues.

This is just the start, Mid Devon are working with Exeter University to understand our current Carbon base line, from that we can continue with other actions that both reduce and mitigate our carbon footprint, as I say, it's a big task but we have made an excellent start.

Do you recycle? Mid Devon do a curb side Re-cycling collection as well as fortnightly garden waste collection, yes you have to pay for the latter and despite past doom and gloom mongers' it has proven fantastically popular and has over ten thousand subscribers.

Please do have a look at how you present your refuse, if you need another recycling box or food bin or want to join the thousands who subscribes the garden waste scheme, just call 01884 255255.

In a check last year Devon County council opened hundreds of bags of waste prior to them going into the energy from waste furnace in Exeter, many contained food, as well as large amounts of glass, plastic, paper, cardboard etc. so please if you can place all tins, glass bottles / jars, cardboard, papers and plastic items into your recycling box's, despite the rumours Mid Devon can provide an audit check detailing where all our recycling goes and NO none of it goes abroad or into landfill.

On that subject the landfill site just outside Uffculme is now closed and takes no waste what so ever, it's now in what is known as aftercare and restoration mode, if you have any questions, please do contact me as I chair the liaison group for MDDC for both landfill and the quarry sites.

Talking about Quarry sites, after a very long battle I am extremely pleased to confirm that Aggregate Industries are at last putting a public footpath around the areas that have been quarried out and are now restored, this was / is part of the agreed restoration plan, unfortunately it's taken quite a bit of pushing and shoving to get them to actually start putting this into place, I'm told the initial stage will be ready for you and I to walk by March this year, bit like the co-op crossing, took time but got there in the end.

May I ask if you have some spare time and are willing to look at helping a charity called home start, their details are below and they have just been given two years funding and are starting up in Mid Devon, I have shamelessly copied some detail below, if you are interested and want to chat to them, I'm sure they will be delighted to talk to you. Also if you need to chat about receiving some assistance please contact them. Home-Start provides one to one parent support to families with children under the age of 5yrs, it helps families to find a way back to being stable and able to manage their own lives. They are initially looking for any volunteers who have had relevant parenting experience and can offer 3-4 hours a week to support a family.

#### OUR CHANCE TO AFFECT THE FUTURE OF WILLAND

In this magazine you will find a questionnaire. This is the first step in consulting you and setting a Neighbourhood Plan for Willand. Please complete it as soon as you can.

Introduced in the Localism Act 2011 a Neighbourhood Plan is a way for us to influence the planning of the area in which we live and work. It can also be used to strengthen our shared vision for the community of Willand. The Parish Council has set up a separate group to develop this.

Of course, a lot of decisions have already been made about Willand, but it can only be a good thing for us to strengthen our community voice in the future development of our village. It will also give us all a better idea about how we can strengthen further the community we live in.

The plan is produced by a process of local consultation, and results in a document that sets out planning policies for Willand – policies that are used to decide whether to approve planning applications. The final document will be voted on by all the residents of Willand and will reflect the views of the people who know and love Willand, the local community, rather than the Local Planning Authority. It will also give us all a wider view of how we can take the whole community forward.

We are also contacting businesses, voluntary and community organisations who operate in or for Willand to hear their views. The school has agreed to help us to consult younger children. We need all the contributions by the end of March.

We will bring all the answers together and let you know the results. These will give us a lead on the next steps in consulting with you. #### WILLAND PARISH COUNCIL PRECEPT 2020-2021

This is the precept requested by Willand Parish Council for the year April 2020 to March 2021. The Parish Council carefully considered the current income and expenditure which enables it to do the things it has to do within the Parish and those that improve the village for everyone. This year there will be a small rise in the precept but it is less than one pound per household for the whole year.

The income figures are based very much on the actuals from this year, the project line is blank as the Parish Council have not identified sources of funding. Money has been secured from Devon County Council towards the cost of verge cutting. You may notice that income from the cemetery has fallen this year and this is reflected in the budget for next year, it is not possible to accurately reflect income from the cemetery but the maintenance costs are ongoing.

Contracts are either ongoing or have been awarded for all the ground maintenance within the village and the figures reflect these contracts. The decision was taken to extend the weed management on to the motorway bridge for the coming year as it has been becoming more unsightly.

The Parish Council made the decision to seek additional administrative support for the coming year and have made an allowance for this in the salary budget line. You will notice from the figures that the Parish Council is expecting some underspend during the current year and will be using £5000 to offset some of the expected expenditure next year so keeping the precept figure down as much as possible.

Total income expected £ 20,063 + £5,000 = £ 25,063

#### WILLAND HISTORY GROUP

At the end of January, the History Group held their first meeting for a long time, and after a few years of effective dormancy there was some enthusiasm for getting a bit more active, in a modest way. Ideas mooted included a 'parish walk' or two later in the year to record some of the many recent changes to Willand, photographing other areas before they too are overtaken by development. It is also planned to hold a small exhibition on 'Willand and the Second World War' to commemorate the 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of VE Day and VJ Day. A next meeting has been planned for Tuesday, 31 March 2020, at 7.30pm in The Annex of Willand Village Hall. Anyone interested would be more than welcome to join us feel free to get in touch; there's no expectation to contribute, just come along and see what we're about.

It was 75 years ago from now, with the Second World War entering its final months, that Willand enjoyed the happy occasion of the marriage of Winifred Edworthy and Walter Scott at St Mary's Church on 20 February 1945, officiated by Revd Andrews, with Miss Browse at the organ. Walter Scott was an Exeter lad and a soldier, home on leave from Burma, having served five years abroad with the Devonshire Regiment. The bride, Winifred Edworthy, was a Willand girl and serving in the Auxiliary Territorial Service, the women's branch of the British Army. As reported in the Devon & Somerset News, for the wedding service she was "prettily attired in an ankle-length dress of white satin beaute on close-fitting lines (lent by a friend). Her full-length net veil was held in place by a tiara of orange blossom and pearls (also leant by a friend). She wore white satin shoes. and her bouquet was of red carnations and trailing fern." As around 80 guests were being entertained at the reception at the 'Assembly Rooms', Tiverton Junction, the happy couple left for their honeymoon in Exeter. A week or so later, on Saturday, 3 March 1945, Willand United Services Club held 'A Grand Dance' from 7.30-11.30 p.m. with music from the Rhythm Aces Band. There were spot prices, and, of course, refreshments, and all proceeds from the entrance fee - 'two and six' (2 shillings, 6 pence), or 'one and six' if you were in the Forces - were to be invested in Defence Bonds in aid of a 'Club Hall' after the war, a project that eventually led to the building of Willand Village Hall. Can you tell us any more about Willand United Services Club, or the dances they held?

We also want to remind everyone that we are still custodians of the Willand Archive, and continue to gather material – photos (copies and originals), documents and artefacts – associated with any aspect of Willand's past, right up to the present day. This could be items to do with family history, buildings, businesses, farming, church and chapel, shops, houses, village events, the school, sports, clubs and other organisations; more or less anything really, you'd be surprised what local historians find interesting! Especially if you're having a clear out, if you find something that has a connection to Willand, before you throw it out, we'd love to hear from you (telephone number or email below – or alternatively, if it's just a document or two, you could post them in an envelope

addressed to 'John Crocker, Willand History Group' in the Willand Village Hall post box, next to the side entrance, by the kitchen, and they will find a grateful home in the Archive).

One of our members has recently been asked the reason why the name Round The World is traditionally used by people in Willand for the loop that goes roughly from the Village Hall, through the subway under the M5, past the top of Two Sisters and around Dean Hill Road, then over the M5, past the ESSO garage (Goffy's), and down the 'main road' back to Gables Road. It was suggested that it could have originated with the Tracey family of The Gables back in the late-1800s. Does anyone know the reason why?

Finally, an appeal on behalf of Devon History Society who are looking for "iconic images that express the essence of the county in the 1920s" for their 'Devon in the 1920s' project. #### **BOUNDARY COMMISSION REPORT**

The Boundary Commission has presented its draft recommendations for the Mid Devon Ward boundaries open for consultation until 13 April 2020. There is information on the Parish website with a copy of the report attached. The Parish Council will be submitting a response as the proposal leaves the Mid Devon Business Park, Hitchcocks Farm and the new houses at the end of the Uffculme straight in Halberton yet adds part of Kentisbeare to the Lower Culm Ward.

Willand and Uffculme Parish Councils suggested that the Ward boundary should be amended to include the land between the motorway up to junction 27 and along the A38 to meet the current boundary, Willand also suggested that the boundary should be extended towards Halberton to incorporate the houses just outside the parish on the road to Halberton. Page 14 of the report has the relevant map and the Commissions views are in paragraphs 59 - 64

Submit a response to the Boundary Commission supporting the change as suggested by the parish council include the following in your reasons for this


- a) The bulk of Mid Devon Business Park, all of Hitchcocks Business Park and the 90 houses being built at the end of Uffculme Straight are in Halberton and although the activities and development directly impact on Willand and/or Uffculme residents the parish councils and Ward Councillors are not automatically consulted on any developments.
- b) Muxbeare Lane properties are outside the Ward but automatically identify with Willand
- c) The Church has already amended its boundaries along the suggested lines.
