When you purchase bags of compost, we would be grateful if you please return the empty bags. Please look in your sheds/garages or even if you know someone who has could you let them know of our need! Bring them back to enable us to continue would be really good! Thankyou.

WILLAND PARISH COUNCIL CHAIR - COMMENT & REPORT

Covid-19 is still with us; Government guidelines are changing by the day to try and keep up with the changing situation; who knows what is happening to the economy and what the future holds in store for our working members of the community as the funds for furlough schemes come to an end? There will be a need for us to think and work together as a community as we go forward. There has been a small rise in cases of Covid-19 in Mid Devon as I write this but by the time you read this all may well have changed again – that is the nature of the situation. Please stick to the guidelines, use common sense and consider



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others. It may not affect younger members so badly but you can spread it to others – remember – **DON'T KILL YOUR GRANNY** – or in my case 'your grandad'.

We are suffering many instances of Fly Tipping around the village, particularly in the Dean Hill Road area. If you see instances of this please report it by email to MDDC Customer Services with the exact location and what is there black bags, bed, etc. and if you can, attach a photograph. If you see someone actually do it please take the vehicle number and report that. Some residents have CCTV and there has been some very good footage come forward.

Can we please have a look at our hedges, shrubs and plants which are next to pavements and if they are encroaching over the pavement please cut them back. With the need for social distancing and with all the walkers, runners and dog walkers we have around the village we really need the full width. If you see a problem and cannot speak to the owner yourself then please report the location and problem to the Parish Clerk and she will see what can be achieved. The last thing we need is County Highways having to serve a notice, or worse, on our residents.

Some have got rather excited at the amount of money the Parish Council has in its bank account. It has to be realised that the Parish has a number of assets which require there to be a 'sinking fund' to be built up for the future maintenance and replacement. Quite a substantial sum will soon be used as the order has been placed for the cemetery extension to be fenced and then boundary planting has to take place. Play equipment needs maintaining and replacing when it comes to end of life. Those using the Jubilee Field will note there has been a closure of the fenced area of the playing field to enable some equipment to be replaced and the safety surface needed replacing. The surface around the skateboard ramps has been repaired and before you know it $\pounds 50,000+$ is gone from the account. The Parish Council is trying to be prudent to build up the reserve over a period of time rather than 'hike up' the precept when a big bill is due. The other alternative is the closure of areas and/or removal of equipment.

On the subject of removal, it will be noticed that the sides have been removed from the shelter in the Jubilee Field. This has become necessary due to offensive graffiti on them and also misuse of the facility by a minority of individuals. The sides are stored and may be cleaned up and replaced in the future. A picnic bench has recently been added to facilities in the Orchard Way play area for the benefit of families whilst using the play equipment. Again, a minority, oblivious to Covid-19 advice chose to hold a drinks and questionable substance party there. In spite of there being a rubbish bin there it was not used and a local resident cleared up after them [thank you] rather than see the area unusable for others. If this behaviour continues we may be forced into removing that facility. Come on folks a bit of common sense and consideration for others required please.

FOOT HEALTH CLINIC



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The Clerk now has some part time assistance and is able to update and put much more information on the Parish Website and Facebook pages. This is in an attempt to keep our community, or at least those interested, to be as up to date as possible as to what is happening in the village and the area in general.

There has been speculation on other Facebook sites as to what is happening to the trees around the site proposed for up to 125 dwellings on the fields just off Meadow Park. Outline planning permission and access has been approved as the result of an appeal. The Parish Council made application to MDDC for a Tree Preservation Order for the whole site and a temporary one was put in place. The landowner objected to some of the trees being the subject of an order, particularly those on the hedge across the site. Officers stood firm and were only prepared to agree to amend the order for a tree either side of the gateway – the approved entrance – to be taken out from the protection of the order. Common sense dictated that this be done. With my Independent Ward Councillor hat on I was able to propose that the slightly revised order be made permanent and all others on the Planning Committee supported my proposal and the Officer recommendation. The developer still may try and get some trees removed when they put in the details for the final layout but that will be for another day.

There are quite a lot of things being discussed and to be consulted on for the future development of the village and our community wellbeing. Please watch the magazine, website and Facebook and respond when opinions are sought or consultation surveys are set up. This is the only way we Parish Councillors can gauge what you are thinking and wishing for.

As a final note can I remind you all that we are two councillors short for our full quota. The current commitment is one meeting a month via zoom. If you are interested and would like to help your community please contact the Clerk for more details. **Barry G J Warren. Chair of Parish Council.**

DEAR RESIDENTS.

Not much to report this time, Aug is always a quiet month, and haven't really got going yet, but we will get busy from now on, because we will be heading towards budget preparation time, what with covid-19, things will be very different. All our meetings are virtual meetings. If you have any issues, by all means let me know.

I have met with Phil Morgan, County Highways Officer, over the Doing What Matters, he has now put together a plan of the three most needed roads for attention in each Parish, this now will be considered by the asset management team, because there will not be enough funds available to complete all the schemes of every Parish in this next year.

There is a Government white paper due out later this month concerning changes to the structure of local government and a possible move to unitary council system. County Council Network have produced a document analysing the possible savings in expenditure on a yearly basis of each County being allowed to become a unitary council on existing boundaries. There is a document been produced on this, it is 70 pages long, but I have not read it yet.

The document talks about unitaries being between 300k to 600k+ electorate, this will have to be taken into consideration if change is made in Devon because Plymouth and Torbay are relatively small unitaries. One of the criteria, is that all unitaries must have whole district areas, such as the whole of Mid Devon being part of a unitary. It would look like Devon would have two unitaries at least because of the numbers. I think the white paper is heavy on creating unitary councils as opposed to two tier councils. A number of Counties have already been having early conversations with Government with a request to change to unitaries. Most Counties have had counter proposals being put forward by Districts, grouping themselves into smaller units by claiming to be reflecting to be better needs of the residents. We will have to watch this space. I think this is what has brought about GESP, which has been rejected by East Devon and now Mid Devon, so that is dead, but, I think a different version will come back





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for consultation because of the `Need to co-operate with other local Councils`, this something that is required within the planning process.

As the schools are now back from their lockdown and holidays, most schools in Devon, over 90% have returned for schooling. I haven't heard of any issues within the Culm Valley area, so assume there are no immediate issues. It must be very difficult for schools to work within the law, just hope they will be able to keep everyone safe.

"Nationally, you'll be aware that the number of confirmed covid-19 cases in some areas are rising, which has led to tighter restrictions being introduced. Although Devon's rates have been comparatively low so far, we cannot be complacent. Just like the rest of the country, we have seen a significant rise in the number of confirmed cases in September. Not all new cases are now linked to returning international travellers, which was the pattern we had seen recently. We must remember that coronavirus is still a very real threat to us all, especially to our older and vulnerable residents."

You may have heard England's Deputy Chief Medical Officer, Professor Jonathan Van Tam, describing the latest "big change" in coronavirus infections across the UK as a "great concern" and that he believes we are in for a "bumpy ride over the next few months" if people did not adhere more stringently to the social distancing rules.

New rules from Monday (14 September). People will not be able to meet socially with others from other households in groups of more than six people.

That applies indoors and outdoors, including in people's own homes.

Rules around social distancing and the use of face coverings still apply too.

There will be penalties for breaching the new rules. The police will have powers to enforce, and fines of £100 could be issued. Fines will keep doubling for further breaches, to a maximum of £3,200.

We are committed to providing the best quality and support for dementia care and are collaborating with care home providers to support sharing of best practice and to review briefings from the Alzheimer's Society and Dementia UK who we already work closely with.

WILLAND HISTORY GROUP

September 2020 marked the 80th anniversary of one of Willand's proudest moments, when the whole community contributed to the nation's efforts to win the Second World War. It was the time of the Battle of Britain, when the Royal Air Force successfully defended British air space from the German air force, so thwarting any chance they had of invading England. The government appealed for a Spitfire Fund of public donations to build aircraft, so the people of Willand decided to do their bit. A committee was formed – led by Major Lane, Oswald Little and Frederick Holloway – and they pledged to raise as much money as

possible towards the cost of building a Spitfire, one of the RAF's iconic fighter aircraft.

Starting from Monday, 2 September 1940, they organised a Willand Spitfire Week of intensive fundraising activities. There were darts competitions at the Halfway House, and skittles competitions at the Railway Hotel (then Willand's other pub, later knocked down when the M5 was built), as well as door-to-door collections, whist drives, a produce auction and a tennis tournament. The events culminated on the Saturday with a sports day - when Miss Gay was crowned Willand's 'Spitfire Queen' - with stalls and sideshows. In the evening there followed a 'grand' dance at the Assembly Room (also lost to the M5), and "Thus ended a proud and memorable week for little Willand." Just about everyone in the parish was involved in some way, and they had every right to feel proud: they raised an impressive £192, 10 shillings and 3 pence - according to the National Archives' currency converter this would have been worth about £7,575 today. The money was sent to the Ministry of Aircraft Production, which was headed by Lord Beaverbrook, who promptly replied in a letter dated 28 September 1940: "The people of Willand have paid a noble tribute to the gallantry of our airmen. And by their resourcefulness and generosity they have added strength to the Royal Air Force. I send to them my warm thanks. They have given splendid evidence of the spirit which animates our country to-day. Yours faithfully, Beaverbrook."

Willand's fundraising effort was not the only reason for the RAF's success in the Battle Britain, another reason was because, during September 1940, the Germans changed tactics and started bombing London, so starting the Blitz. But this also had a knock-on effect for Willand, because it prompted a firm called Bramber Engineering to move part of their business from Cricklewood in London to a site on South View Road in Willand (where K&S Auto Services is now). Bramber's made vehicle springs, trailers and trailer components, and by 1940 were engaged in war work, including a contract to make parts for tanks. The Germans bombs posed a serious threat to their irreplaceable machinery, so they moved it to Willand - where components were made and then transported back to their London works for assembly. Several of their London employees came down as well, and were billeted in the parish, but as the war went on and the business expanded many local people were employed. A post-war report emphasised that: "Special tribute should be paid to the many women operators who worked the machines both night and day." The hours were long, and the work was difficult and repetitive, and much of it had to be kept secret, even between fellow workers.

After the war, Bramber's kept on their Willand workshops, concentrating on the repair of springs, wheels, axle beams and chassis frames, contracting to bus companies from as far away as the Midlands. By 1965 over 60 people were employed by Bramber's in the offices and on the shop floor at Willand, and by the 1970s the Willand site specialised in the manufacture of boat trailers. The end for Bramber's in Willand came in 2010, after the business was essentially

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seen off by the 2008 global financial crisis – so concluding, after 70 years, one of the unforeseen consequences of the London Blitz. If you have any memories of working for Bramber's, or the people who worked there, or can add any more information about their war work, or the years after the war, we would love to hear from you. MDDC NEWS

Independent Councillor Barry G J Warren

I have covered some issues in my Parish Council Report and Comment and so I will not duplicate them here. There is quite a lot going on at present with a lot of 'wheeling and dealing' and party spin being put on some things. I thought it may help to give some comment/news through my Independent and Non-Party Political eyes even if some of you will have formed a different view.

Since May 2019 MDDC has been led by an alliance of Liberal Democrats and Independents, sometime with support from Green Party members. The appointed leader stands as an Independent and he can select his own Cabinet Members. As the voters of Mid Devon had placed no overall party in power the leader tried to form a Cabinet which contained members from all parties. The



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Conservatives declined to participate and declared that they would form an opposition.

Since that time the current administration has taken time to try and get to the bottom of some of the activities and policies of the previous administration. There has been some alleged prevarication which has not helped.

There have been discussions with Exeter City Council and Teignbridge, East Devon and Mid Devon District Councils to form a plan known as GESP [Greater Exeter Strategic Plan]. Basically it would mean a lot more building of houses to meet Government targets and it appears that East and Mid Devon would end up with a disproportionate amount of housing compared with the other two areas. In the main it was perceived as providing housing for residents to commute into Exeter to work. A very comprehensive plan was presented for public consultation but in the view of some, me included, there were a lot of unanswered questions and in particular what the public was being consulted on. East Devon District Council by 33 to 22 votes decided to reject the plan and did not send it out to consultation. The leader of MDDC wanted to continue discussions with the three other councils but he was outvoted 7 to 1 in Cabinet. There were discussions behind closed doors which I have been unable to obtain the exact detail of but the outcome was that the leader did a 'deal' with the Conservative leadership. When the item was discussed at Full Council the leader put forward an amendment contrary to Cabinet wishes and the Liberal Democrats put forward their own amendment. The leader got his own amendment through with Conservative support.

The outcome was that the four Liberal Democrats on cabinet had their portfolios 'terminated' [sacked] and were replaced by four Conservatives – remember they would not take part when originally invited.

Decisions are now being made behind closed doors on some issues and we appear to be losing the intention for the Council to be more open, transparent and accountable that some of us stood for and can now do little about because of the change. We will keep trying so watch this space. I could say a lot more but I expect you have had enough by now. There have been press releases – 'economical with the truth' are the words which come to mind.

MDDC are very active in many areas supporting National and Local arrangements to support businesses and the public at large. Great efforts are being made by officers to make safety arrangements in the three main towns and Bampton to allow the shops to open and bring some vitality back to the area. Sadly some of the big named shops may be lost but all the more reason to support our local independent businesses. There is a lot of information on the website and there are regular press releases.

Covid and the lockdowns have had a devastating effect on the budget set to provide our services. The two main sources of revenue are car parks and leisure centres and their income has been very little. Government are releasing some funds through and although this is helping it will not cover all the losses.



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A new budget will have to be set very soon and this may see some services cut or reduced. Councillors will do the best they can to keep things going as best as able.

Have you noted that the recycling teams will now take small electrical items and will again take clothing so please let us recycle all we can.

The Government are suggesting changes to Planning Law to make it easier for developers to build more houses and Local Authorities will be penalised if they do not achieve targets but no matter how many planning permissions are given there is nothing in the changes to make housebuilders build – they will not build too many otherwise they cannot keep the prices up. Having read the proposals and attended officer briefings it is very obvious to me that the big developers are writing the policy. Am I a cynic – no just realistic? If you are asked to respond to a consultation please do so.

The White Paper sets out what it describes as 'radical reform unlike anything we have seen since the Second World War'. It sets out a new vision for the planning system addressing:

- 1. Plan making
- 2. A digital first approach
- 3. A new focus on design and sustainability
- 4. Reform of developer contributions

5. Increase development land availability and support for town centre renewal

6. A more engaging, equitable and effective system

Reform is proposed around 3 'pillars' of the planning system:

1. Planning for development – a revised approach for plan making including identifying areas for growth (outline planning permission granted automatically), areas for renewal (where there will be a presumption in favour of development) and areas for protection (to be defined nationally and locally).

- 2. Planning for beautiful and sustainable places
- 3. Planning for infrastructure and connected places

That's it for now, the days are shorter and the temperature is definitely dropping. Keep an eye on those who live alone. Look after yourself and as always if you have any questions or concerns please contact me or any of your other district councillors, after all that's what we are here for.
