Welcome to this spring edition we have lots of contributors, so I hope you enjoy your read. If you would be interested in joining an editorial team to take the magazine forward, then please get in touch.

WILLAND COMMUNITY VOLUNTEERS

Willand is already a really good community with many good activities undertaken by lots of residents for the benefit of the whole village. However, as the village grows, and we get increasingly less support and engagement from public bodies, we need to take steps to ensure that the community continues to look after itself and also formulates plans to make Willand an even nicer, and safer, place to live.

This is especially true of MDDC and the police team. As their budgets come under even more pressure, we are the ones who suffer when they neglect, or cease, some of the activities they have traditionally undertaken but some of these activities could be taken on by a network of community volunteers. Some of the activities would need to have the blessing of the police and/or MDDC and need some form of training from them. This would include things like Community Speedwatch, parking and hedge trimming (not, I hasten to add, as a team of vigilantes!!). It will also include established activities such as Neighbourhood Watch.

So, over the coming weeks we will be setting up the Willand Community Volunteers network, a formal team of volunteers, each responsible for a specific part of the village. We will start by breaking the village down into 5 areas, each with a Community Co-ordinator, to make it easier to engage with residents to find out what issues they would like to see tackled in their area some issues will be specific to a particular area and some common across the village, eg people not picking up their dog's mess.

Over time, as we learn how best to do things and we get more volunteers, these areas can be broken down so that co-ordinators look after say 20 houses. That way, they get to know the vulnerable/elderly/lonely residents as well as everyone else. We get to look out for each other.

The volunteer team would be separate to the parish council but work closely alongside them to help implement agreed plans and get feedback when required. That's as far as we've got at the time of writing and we hope it meets with everyone's approval. Watch this space! **David Marrow**

NOTES FROM BOB EVANS WARD COUNCILLOR LOWER CULM

Is it me or does time go quicker as you get older? I'm sure it was only last week I was sat writing my last comments for the magazine!

I'm going to start with some useful info and numbers, as one of your ward members I have received information from Wales and West Utilities, the text below is a simply cut and paste job from their communication, I hope it does not

need to be used however you may wish to keep this edition of the magazine in a drawer just in case.

Wales and West Utilities launched a social media campaign reminding people who to contact if they have problems with their heating or their gas supply over the coming weeks.

Twitter If you're having issues with your boiler in the cold weather, this is what you need to know. Please only call @wwwtilities National Gas Emergency Number if you have a gas emergency, a gas leak or suspect carbon monoxide wwwtilities.co.uk/boilerproblems

Facebook/LinkedIn with the weather getting cold, it's really important that only people who smell gas, have a gas leak, low gas pressure or suspect the presence of carbon monoxide should call the National Gas Emergency Number on 0800 111 999 so Wales & West Utilities can keep them safe.

If you have frozen boiler condensate pipes you can try and defrost them yourself using heat wraps or warm water but if this doesn't work, please call a Gas Safe Registered engineer or your gas supplier. For a Gas Safe Registered engineer in your area call 0800 408 5500 or visit gassaferegister.co.uk. You can find the contact details of your gas supplier on your bill. wwwtilities.co.uk/boilerproblems/

Moving forward it's fantastic to see the crossing now in place in South View Road, I think 'better late than never' covers it.

As somebody who has represented the ward of Lower Culm for very nearly 8 years now you may not be surprised to find I am a great believer in democracy and that local politics is about local people and local issues and I believe it takes local people to represent local residents. So, for the final time may I remind all that we have full District council elections on 2nd May and if anybody reading this is interested in standing for election or you think you know somebody who may be, look on the MDDC web pages.

I would also encourage all to ensure you have a say, local elections attract far fewer voters than national elections, so if you are able to vote and do so your vote really does count.

I would like to move on to my in box and the most prevalent issues being raised, well let me concentrate on one, dog mess!

The issue is probably one of the easiest and cheapest issues that can be sorted out, no need to incur any cost, no need to seek enforcement, for the few lazy, selfish, inconsiderate individuals, PICK IT UP! It's your dog, it's your responsibility.

I make no apology that individuals who have written to me asking that the District Council sort the problem out have met with a consistent argument that it's not their job, why should all residents pay for the few that can't be bothered to respect their own village.

Your council have a number of statutory duties (legally required) to perform, bin collection, planning, enforcement, licensing the list goes on, with tight budgets why would MDDC choose to spend money in an area that is discretionary and almost impossible to catch people walking on bye after their dog has messed, any sight of an enforcement officer or a MDDC van and they don't leave it on that day.

Your parish council have requested MDDC to provide a new dog poo bin in Willand Moor road, this is currently being reviewed by MDDC under the process that covers the request, unfortunately placing another bin adds costs on both supply and collection, I have suggested that given MDDC have a policy that "any bin will do" so bagged dog poo can be placed in any rubbish bin (except those within play areas) that one of the two bins that sit by the bench at the top of Willand Old Village, garage end, could be moved, the PC would need to pay for the transfer but there would be no on costs as the bin already exists so is part of the collection numbers, I await their decision.

If moved let's hope people use it!!

It's been stated that other councils use fines as an income stream and deterrent and a specific council was named given the volumes of fines they report, unfortunately it's not the council doing the fines, they have employed a private enforcement company who evidently need to raise revenue to pay for the contract. Their own web site proudly details officials with body cams and plain clothes teams, local press carries stories of parents being pursued after toddlers drop sweet wrappers out of push chairs Not a path, I would support but would be interested in your opinions?

WILLAND HISTORY GROUP

First of all, it gives us considerable pride to report that Willand's first blue plaque 'to commemorate the life and achievements' of Margaret Mary Partridge BSc, MIEE (1891-1967) will be unveiled at Harpitt House on Wednesday, 6 March 2019, at 2pm. The plaque, which has been organised and funded by Devon History Society, recognises Miss Partridge's pioneering work as a woman engineer.

We have discussed elements of Miss Partridge's life and times before in these articles, but it is worth reiterating her groundbreaking role in a male-dominated profession. During the First World War, Miss Partridge was employed by an engineering firm in London, working in munitions, but after the war opportunities for women within the industry diminished as men returned to employment. Therefore, in 1919 Miss Partridge returned to Devon and courageously set up her own business as an independent consulting engineer, specialising in 'providing lighting and electric power', particularly to farms and country houses. She worked hard not only to overcome suspicion of this newfangled electric technology, but also underlying suspicion of her, as a business woman forging a path in a man's world. However, through strength of willpower, meticulous attention to detail and considerable engineering skill, Miss Partridge made a success of her business, and among other achievements was responsible for the electrification of Bampton, Cheriton Fitzpaine and South Molton. During the Second World War she founded and became the first secretary of Exeter Munitions Ltd and was appointed Women's Technical Officer for the South West. And, revealing the esteem in which she was held by her peers, she was appointed president of the Women's Engineering Society of Great Britain from 1943-45.

Miss Partridge retired to Willand in 1946, living at Harpitt House with her lifelong friend and former business partner, Miss Margaret Robotham, who was also a renowned woman engineer. Miss Partridge became fully engaged in parish life, including proactive terms as president of the Willand branch of the Women's Institute, and Willand Produce Association. It is often repeated, but true nonetheless, that her most celebrated achievement in Willand was her instruction and supervision of women from the WI who wired the new Willand Village Hall in 1956/57. Working on Wednesdays and Saturdays they installed 21 lights, 21 switches, 6 three kilowatt heating and all the wiring that goes with it. The work done by the WI saved around £250 from the hall budget, and Miss Partridge told the local press: "I had little doubt that the WI members could carry

out the task although most of them were nervous about their ability for the job ... They were apt pupils, particularly those who are normally good at needlework, for their fingers are supple and guick."

In the years after her retirement, Miss Partridge also proved to be a pioneer in the research of Willand's history and was the first person to make a methodical study of parish documents. Writing in private correspondence in November 1952 she describes how: "The parish history section of the Devonshire Association invited 'Willand' to attend one of their meetings ... [we] went for a whole afternoon we were lectured about how to write a parish history – we left rather confounded and confused, but I did bring away one conviction: that the first thing to do is to list what documents there are at hand ... For some curious reason there are, in Willand, 2 copies of Tithe Maps and Tithe Apportionment books, one with Mr Thorne and one, 2 or 3 years earlier date, was with Mr Rowe. When the village gets history-minded we may find other parish documents in possession of one or another – and we hope that private title deeds may prove interesting." Hopefully the village is a bit more 'history-minded' these days, and on 6 March we will pay just tribute to a remarkable woman. James Morrison, 01884 250057 (jamorrison235@gmail.com)

WILLAND PARISH COUNCIL CHAIR - COMMENT & REPORT

At the time of writing this we are five weeks into 2019 but there is good and positive news before we get to the not so good news.

A trio of musicians from the Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra spent a day in Willand on 31st January as the result of liaison between the Orchestra and the Parish Council. In the morning they spent time at the Primary School with the whole school in attendance. In the afternoon the village hall was turned into a café and those living with dementia, family, friends and carers were treated to a Cake Concert. An enjoyable time appears to have been had by all and thanks must go to the willing volunteers who helped on the day and particularly Willand Post Office and The Old Well Garden Centre who provided all the cakes free of

charge. We must see what more can be done to try and bring our community together more often.

The Parish Council has successfully bid for funding to provide more seats on the Jubilee Field to meet a need expressed by many parents who stand around, particularly after school, whilst the children play on the various equipment. Hopefully these will be installed in the next couple of months.

The Willand Preschool has started work on The Gables site so after the initial upheaval that area will look a lot better and fit in with the school and village hall by providing more preschool and community facilities to add to forming a good social hub for the village.

The allotment hedge against Jaycroft has been reduced in height and layered to try and maintain the 'country feel'.

Dog mess is still an issue and a few individuals appear intent on being objectionable to most of us in the village who do not want to stand in the mess or have children exposed to potential disease contamination. Ripping down and stealing warning signs and leaving piles near signs and bins just convinces of their contempt for the rest of the community. As MDDC are not being proactive in this field the Parish Council are looking at preparing an action plan to try and improve things. This could mean responsible dog owners having restrictions placed on them to keep dogs on leads and be banned from some sensitive areas in order to protect the children at play. Not what is wanted so it is hoped that volunteers and responsible dog owners will identify the persistent offenders and we will have them fined and shamed. Not good for community cohesion but one must ask if the offenders want to be an acceptable part of our community? Anyone wanting to help please let us know through the Clerk.

There has been much on social media about parking, or inconsiderate parking. Do we want double yellow lines all around the village? There are a number of 'road safety' issues being considered at the moment, but the village will be consulted before anything is done as it will cost us a lot of money and Devon County Council say they will not pay. Someone put forward the suggestion of creating parking areas on the grass verges around the Somerville Road and Somerlea area. The Parish Council put that idea to MDDC a long time ago and are still awaiting a response. Lots of reasons and excuses and a lack of 'can do' attitude on the part of some!

On the planning front it has been fairly quiet except for the number of applications to cut down or trim trees that were there before the houses were built. It still surprises me how planning permission is given to build houses so close to established trees when there is ample advice as to what size trees grow and the margins which should be given to allow for root and canopy areas. Some will have seen the 'conversations' as to the trees being cut down and hedgerows decimated on phase two of the Mid Devon Business Park. To remove any doubt this is in Halberton Parish but your councillors have received communications from a number officers of MDDC trying to justify what has gone

on. Apparently taking all the vegetation from a hedge and removing wildlife habitat is OK as it is 'coppicing'??? Have a look in the dictionary as to what that really means! I do not think that the dormice will be impressed. Oak trees have been cut down but that is OK as they were not protected but those that are left have now been made the subject of protection orders. If everything is OK then some have asked why it is necessary to put the orders in place now. Why were they not put in place at the time the outline planning permission was granted? Something about 'shutting the stable door' comes to mind!

The local plan review hearings will have been completed by the time you read this and then the findings of the Inspector will be awaited. We have not heard anything further about the appeal into the refusal of 125 houses at Meadow Park. Consultations are taking place in relation to the Garden Village proposed on the East of Cullompton. Please have a look at what is proposed as it will come right up to our parish boundary on its northern edge.

The pedestrian crossing in South View Road is up and working and there may be more improvements in the vicinity in the future so watch this space.

Sadly there was a chemical leak at 2 Sisters which appears to have been dealt with promptly with a good turnout from the Fire and Ambulance Services. People taken to hospital, residential properties evacuated but the police declined to attend when requested. Whatever happened to their priority of 'the protection of life and property' which every officer used to include in their oath on appointment? Not criticising the officers on the ground as they are doing their best but surely the gimmicks and politics at a higher level needs questioning?

We have elections coming up for 11 Parish Councillors and 3 District Councillors for our area. The last time there was no election in this area as not enough candidates came forward. If the same happens again due to apathy, or whatever, we cannot really complain if we get what we deserve. We, in the Parish, can make a difference but there are a lot of obstructions and frustrations put in our way at times.

NEW OPPORTUNITY FOR RURAL MICRO BUSINESSES TO VOICE THEIR OPINIONS AND HELP DESIGN FUTURE SUPPORT PROGRAMMES

Devon County Council is launching a research project which aims to engage with rural businesses and sole traders to find out what might be preventing them from boosting their productivity and what help they may need.

The 'Engaging Rural Micros' project will initially look to engage with over 100 micro businesses, targeting the Mid Devon and North Devon area through short surveys, detailed conversations, focus groups and other research.

Micro businesses* make up 90 percent of the rural economy in Devon, which makes their continued development essential to the future of the County's economy.

The Engaging Rural Micros research is calling for micro businesses in four less productive sectors to share their experiences. These sectors are health and social care; manufacturing; trades (e.g. construction, market traders, lifestyle businesses); and tourism (including accommodation, food and retail).

The aim of the initiative will be to find out more about the needs of these businesses and how to make it easier for them to access and engage with business support programmes in Devon. Micro businesses or sole traders in any of these four sectors (outlined above) are invited to contact the project team about their needs, what they think of the current support on offer, to help ensure future support programmes are right for their business.

There are lots of ways to get involved, ranging from a two minute questionnaire, to a whole day discussing needs and helping to design a support programme that's right for local businesses.

The findings of this project will be used to inform the design of a new trial to help prepare businesses to embrace development opportunities. The trial could enable them to confidently take advantage of mainstream business support and use their time and resources more effectively to increase profitability and productivity. Businesses taking part in the research will have the opportunity to express an interest in taking part in the business support trial.

Councillor Rufus Gilbert, Devon County Council Cabinet Member for Economy, Enterprise and Skills, said: "This is an excellent opportunity to learn first-hand what the barriers to rural economic growth really are, and a stepping stone towards better engagement with micro businesses. This provides them with a platform to make their voices heard and tell us about their needs. Micro businesses underpin our local economy, so encouraging the four target sectors to embrace innovation and modern business practises will have a much wider impact, stimulating productivity across our economy."

Rural micro businesses and sole traders in Mid Devon and North Devon in the sectors of health and social care; manufacturing; trades; and tourism, can

WILLAND PARISH COUNCIL PRECEPT 2019 -2020

Willand Parish Council have requested a precept of £56,317 from Mid Devon District Council for the coming financial year. This represents a modest increase of £895 on the year 2018/19. Last year was the final year for the Local Authority grant so this year the total sum will be raised from the residents. According to the figures provided by MDDC this rise will mean an increase in the Willand Parish portion of the Council Tax bill of £1.48 for a band D household - an extra 03pence a week.

The Parish Council have continued to raise funds from other sources during this year to support the projects it has undertaken, so for example the budget for new play equipment is showing as overspent but in fact a grant of £3,000 was received towards it. There were also generous contributions from business' and groups for the Christmas lights. The Parish Council will actively seek money to support the work it is doing in the parish for the coming year. When the precept was set it was agreed to increase the expected income from the cemetery, although this is difficult to predict. The company that prints the magazine has amalgamated with a larger concern and it is not known how this may affect the printing costs during the coming year hence the slight increase in costs to allow for this. The Parish Council are in negotiation with MDDC to take on the Orchard Way open space and have allowed for this in the projected costs for play areas. The heading Village projects covers the expected expenditure on Christmas lights, planters, bus shelters, CCTV etc that the Parish Council have supported for a number of years.

ST. MARY'S RESTORATION APPEAL – UPDATE REPORT DECEMBER 2018

For both congregation and community in Willand, we have been truly blessed, as against all odds we have achieved our target and signed the contract to restore our beautiful and precious parish church to preserve it for future generations. Since my last report we have received most generous grants from the Garfield Weston Foundation and Foxglove Trust which, together with contributions from a wonderful choral evening led by the Wyndham Singers and gifts from adjacent parish groups, led us to hope that we might be able to achieve our target before the end of the year. Then to our delight, in late November, we were given the news that our application to Viridor Credits for the balance of funding required had been accepted in full.

Within two weeks we had completed all necessary clarification with the DAC and were able to sign the contract with Corbel Conservation, who started work before Christmas with a programme to complete before the end of March 2019. The Cypress tree that threatened the East End has already gone and some minor preparation work has been initiated, aiming to start in earnest after the Christmas/New Year break. There will inevitably be some interruption to church opening times, but we have been assured that our services will be able to continue as usual.

Once again, I cannot emphasise too strongly how grateful we all are, PCC, congregation and members of our community of Willand, for the latest of these most generous contributions. Our prayers have certainly been answered, and with the Lord's help, we can now look forward to re-dedicating a fully restored St. Mary's parish church before Easter, secure in the knowledge that this generation has played its part in full to safeguard its future now and for generations to come. **Simon Talbot Rector 5 January 2019**

WILLAND ROVERS -- MONUMENTAL MEN, LADIES AND LADS

Well I am sure you will have seen or heard the Willand roar on Saturday 2nd February. The club for only its second time played in the 5th round of the FA Vase we were drawn at home to Deeping Rangers who hail from Lincoln and are geographically pretty close to Peterborough. Due to the miles they had to travel to get to us they came down to the West Country on Friday.

Of course what we could have done without was a snow bomb dumping 3 inches of the white stuff 48 hours before kick-off. Well what do you do? Do you just sit there and hope it all melts away leaving puddles everywhere or do you think well if we clear this off the pitch we may have a chance of playing. Social media shouts were sent out and slowly the volunteers arrived armed with shovels, brooms, wheel barrows and started the momentous task of removing the snow, for the first couple hours it seemed to be a forlorn hope, but by lunchtime some 27 volunteers, men, lasses and lads aged between 10 and 80 were hard at it removing the snow and freeing the grass from its wintry blanket. However, there is always a risk of removing the snow allowed the pitch to freeze

overnight and all that effort would have been to no avail. Saturday came and we passed the 10am pitch inspection – game on.

Now of course the pressure was on the management and players to produce a cup victory. The pitch of course was heavy with the frost gone leaving the top inch sodden. Deeping came at us and put us under pressure for the first 15 minutes and their efforts were rewarded by a goal, they also hit the crossbar and had one disallowed for off side. Willand tried to play and get themselves back in the game, we had a goal disallowed and hit the post but a strike from Brett Worbey took a slight deflection and drew us level. Within a minute Deeping responded to go back ahead. But the half was not done yet Angus Wilson slotted home to again draw us level.

Whatever was in the half time tea and what words of wisdom were spoken? After a slightly low key first half, Willand bossed the second, the post again came to Deeping rescue, two were cleared off the line with the keeper beaten, was it going to be one of the cruel footballing days. But no Willand still had the guile, fight, fitness and strength to make one of the chances count, a delightful through ball found Dean Stamp haring in on goal, the big defender desperately trying to pull him down and on what was now a glue pot of a pitch the ball fell on Deans left foot and once there it was only going in one direction into the back of net between the keepers legs. Much to the raptures of the Willand faithful and the other 700+ support the team in purple from the West Country won the day.

What a game, what 48 hours, who says Willand Community spirit is dead? Everyone volunteers, committee, supporters, management and players have all played their part in creating history.

630 sides started on the journey to Wembley only 8 are left. Willand are now 2 wins away from playing there.

As you read this we should be about to start the last two months of the league season, and what a season it has been. Entertainment is what our Management duo set out to achieve, in the calendar year of 2018 we scored no less than 120 goals averaging over 2 goals a game.

At the time of writing we sit top of the Western league with one defeat in the first 23 games. Even now the wet weather has arrived we continue to play exciting football. In fact we are the top scoring step 5 side in the country.

As mentioned previously the squad has been enhanced by the return of local boy Dean Stamp whose partnership with Craig Duff is now becoming the most feared in the league, with Duff pulling the strings just behind the main striker his arrival has also enhanced the flying wingers Luke Mortimore and Alden play. Goals are aplenty. Veteran David Steele has reached a remarkable landmark with his 150th goal for Willand a fantastic strike from the edge of the area into the bottom corner at Shortwood Dean is close behind with 142 goals for Willand and if he stays for a few more years will undoubtedly become Willand top goal scorer ever. Another in the goals is Luke Mortimore who after 24 in his debut

season which ended in March due to injury has scored 26 already this season, taking him to 50 goals in 73 games which is remarkable for a winger – we are very lucky to have him.

We have been successful in obtaining funding from **Invest in Devon** for some more ground work, the plan is to complete the pitch in fill during the current season.

We are also very grateful to **Lee Waterman, Willand Service Centre** who has provided 2 boots sponsor prizes to the player who has received the most man of the match nominations. For the period of August to the end of December Joe Curtis received his award from Lee after a number of imperious midfield displays, Brad Ausden was a close second.

As mentioned previously we are more than a football club, we have held a number of events all of which have been a great success and lots of fun.

Thank you to all who supported the Christmas Bingo we hope you won and had some fun at the same time. Don't forget that the bingo continues on the 1st and 3rd Tuesdays of the month. **Dominic Clark.**

BLACKDOWN HILLS REPAIR CAFE

A rainy day in Hemyock it may have been but that certainly didn't deter visitors to the sixth Blackdown Hills Repair Café, completing the first year of our bimonthly events. The Parish Hall was packed with volunteer repairers and customers alike and we took in around 120 items during the morning, of which about 60% were mended or fixed and another 15% either taken offsite for repair in a proper workshop or details given of where to access required spare parts.

Let me give you a couple more statistics. At our launch in March 2018, we had 16 volunteer repairers, in January 2019 this figure was 28, covering electrical items, clothing and textiles, bikes, computers, garden tools and knife sharpening, clocks and watches, ceramics, jewellery and small items of furniture. In fact, pretty much everything! And when we began, there were 3 other Repair Cafes in Devon, now we are 8, with more at the starting blocks, including nearby Wellington.

Here is a handful of comments from some of our customers. "The Repair Cafe is a treasure trove of practical skills", "I was most impressed, not just by the service but by the lively atmosphere", "Upcycling at its best!", "Take it along to a Repair Café and let them work their magic", "A village hall packed with enthusiastic volunteers with a multiplicity of skills", and "There's always a lovely warm atmosphere, where I meet old friends & new, have some homemade cake & a cup of tea. What's not to like?!"

And from one of our repairers: "I use each 'job' as a way to engage people in thinking about the repairs being carried out and how to purchase items based on a more repair-centric ideology. The positive and encouraging atmosphere shows there is huge support in the community for these concepts and people clearly prefer to extend the life of items instead of simply buying new".

So we at the Blackdown Hills Transition Group want to thank everyone who has been part of this enterprise – be they volunteer repairers, administrative helpers, loyal customers, Parish Councils and Magazine editors, media contacts, cake makers and anyone else we may have missed – for their wonderful support during our first year.
