Editorial

Welcome to the November & December issue of the magazine the months of remembrance and celebration. Let's start with a couple of thank yous. Remember the boy who was doing that cycle ride to raise money for Arthritis Research UK!

CALLUM'S DEVON COAST TO COAST CYCLE RIDE, MAY 2018.

Thank you for your generous support. Altogether we raised £1551.40 for

Arthritis Research UK. Here is an account of our journey. The sign that marks the beginning of the Devon Coast to Coastllfracombe Pier.

Day 1: Ilfracombe to Torrington:

The beginning of the Devon Coast to Coast Cycle Route is at Ilfracombe Pier, marked with a sign that says 'The Devon Coast to Coast Cycle Route'.



Dad and I cycled out of the seaside town going up very steep hills to join 'Cycle Route 27'; I was exhausted at the top of the hill (as it was climbing for over 200m!) Thankfully, the next part was cycle path and it was very flat.

We cycled past wooden sculptures carved into benches and huge reservoirs. The path was quite bumpy in places and I found the rocky terrain was slightly challenging, but I managed. The path took us downhill-which was slightly more fun- through Braunton and from then on it was flat. We were cycling the Tarka Trail. With my legs aching I finished day 1 at Torrington Station.

Day 2: Torrington to Okehampton:

The next part of the Coast to Coast started off at Torrington Station, where I had finished the day before. After a while we reached the end of the Tarka Trail cycle path and then had to cycle on the road. This section was torturous as hill after hill after hill came. I could barely walk up the hills, let alone cycle. It was 150 metres uphill! It was tiring work and I still had another 20km to go to get to Okehampton!!!We cycled up seemingly never-ending hills; it was extremely hard work, especially in the blistering sun. It was 28 degrees now!

I slowly descended down the gentle slope leading away from Hatherleigh and had started making my way up the next gigantic hill leading towards Okehampton; my target destination to finish off today. I had now started to find out about a new difficulty - water. I had drunk so much out of my 3 litre water pack already -as it was a hot day and I needed to keep hydrated- that I had begun to run out of water rapidly, so I had to ration my water for a bit. Slowly I ascended the 200m. Finally, with my legs in agony I reached the top of the hill. I had quite a long break before I set off again ... facing another huge hill up the hill to my destination point at Okehampton Train Station. I was relieved to complete the 2nd day of the 3 day challenge.

Day 3: Okehampton to Plymouth:

Starting off at Okehampton Train Station, I started cycling on the Granite Way cycle path which had a gradual slope ascending over 200m. The 15km Granite Way cycle path ended quite quickly. The cycle path took me onto the road for a bit, I passed Lydford gorge, which has the deepest river gorge in the south – west, with a spectacular 30m water fall. I carried on going up the treacherous hills near Brent Tor, which stands on the western edge of Dartmoor; its 1100ft above sea level-it was very challenging going up those hills which were ascending to nearly 300m!!!

After a too brief downhill to Tavistock there was a long uphill cycle on The Drakes Trail Cycle Path to Yelverton, which is where the famous home of Sir Francis Drake – Buckland Abbey - can be found. I cycled past Buckland Abbey in Yelverton and then onto the narrow lanes, which felt like the road would never end it was so long. Lots of hills awaited me and I had to face the challenge of getting up them. It was very difficult and extremely tiring. It felt like such a long time we'd been cycling on the same road, that I thought we had got lost. But eventually the road led us to a cycle path right next to the busy city traffic of Plymouth.

We cycled on the flat cycle path through Plymouth for another 5km and then we arrived at Smeaton's Tower, on Plymouth Hoe; we had finally completed the Devon Coast to Coast. Dad and I were a bit worn out after the 102 mile bike ride! **Thank you, from Callum.**

REPORT FROM BOB EVANS YOUR LOCAL MID DEVON COUNCILLOR

This issue hasn't seen any difficulty in finding topics to give you updates on, unfortunately there are several so I will cut my rambling short and try to be as concise as I can.

Local plan review

Many will know that the initial hearings regarding J27 land allocation and associated Policy and housing has been heard by the Inspector Mr Paul Griffiths BSc(Hons) BArch IHBC, these were held on 19th and 20th September , Mr Griffiths indicated he is looking to give initial feedback by the end of October , there was no indication of what this may be and so there remain three possibilities, carry on, take it out, amend, each has very different ramifications so we must await his comments. The next round of hearings have to have a further six week lead time, so I'm not expecting anything until early 2019, watch local press or the MDDC web site for updates.

The new CO-OP

Many will know that I welcomed the new store as a valuable addition to choice for the village and backed its application but fought to have a zebra crossing provided to assist safe access, this crossing was conditioned to be in place pre opening yet despite this being known by the agents and co-op all relevant paperwork was not done in time, unfortunately I have now been informed this will not be in place until January, the explanation from DCC is set out below, I have made my feeling very clear and find this a disappointing start for the coops association with the village.

DCC explain.... It is planned that the zebra will be undertaken just after Christmas. The works to install the crossing require a road closure of South view road which would direct traffic via Meadow lane, however should there be an accident in the works on the A361 between now and Christmas the diversion would be down South view road which if closed would necessitate all the traffic travelling down Meadow lane. In January the works on the A361 will be passed the Sampford junction and while there will still be closures in the Sampford vicinity there number is sufficiently reduced and will allow diversion through Sampford thus avoiding any of the residential estate in Willand.

2 Sisters

I must be extremely careful in my comments here, the situation of odours from this site have been allowed to continue for far too long, I am well into my eighth year now and have been attempting to deal with this issue from day one, even sending copies of E Mails to the Environment Agency (E.A.) from 2011 as evidence of both their and the sites none action. However at last we may be getting some progress given the damning report recently received from the E.A., a small extract is given below. Please please in the mean time report any issues direct to the E.A. on 0800 807060, this really does help!

Extract from E.A. Letter

I can confirm that we have determined operations at the 2 Sisters site are not in compliance with their Environmental Permit with respect to odour. We rate non-compliance at the sites we regulate using a scoring system. 2 Sisters have been scored a CCS2 for failing to comply with the odour condition in their Environment Permit and having a significant impact on the local community.

To address these very serious issues we've required the site to undertake a series of steps to address the odour non-compliances. The site has produced an Action Plan with details of a number of improvements they will be making. All of these actions have deadlines and we will closely monitor their progress.

I hope some may be interested in the following if not for yourself but for your business or a relative.

Devon Alert

Devon & Cornwall Police are continuing to increase the number of residents who are signed up to Devon Alert. They would be really grateful if you could encourage colleagues, communities, residents or professional networks to sign up.

Devon and Cornwall Alert is a free community messaging system to inform members of the public about crimes and incidents affecting their local area. Recorded messages are sent by telephone, email or text message to individuals or groups/businesses.

It is a two-way messaging system which helps the police to connect with our communities; it tells people what is happening in their area and allows them to respond directly with any information.

The system is designed to allow people who register to choose the type of information they would like to receive concerning crime and anti-social behaviour, witness appeals, crime prevention, community events and local good news. Planning, an explanation

A recent application to build 125 houses on Land Adjacent Meadow Park Silver Street was this week refused by the MDDC planning committee in line with the Parish Councils representations to refuse, this may well now result in the applicant making an appeal to the Secretary of State.

Despite the PC's objections I backed the proposal for several reasons, firstly the land already has some building taking place for affordable houses, secondly the site is already allocated for 42 houses so the increase was actually 83 and thirdly the section 106 payments offered gave some £425,000 of direct funding to Willand based projects, these included £52.5k to the PC's own health and community centre, £125k to provide off site skate park and

play equipment and finally the full funding of much needed works at the school to alter the kitchens and hall costing £250k.

No planning application should be determined by offered monies alone and given the site already has allocated housing I was mindful of the many benefits the monies to the school would have had, when complete the extra room would allow far greater flexibility to the staff especially on rainy days, so on this occasion I went against the PC but I think for good reason, unfortunately we are now faced with a possibility that a successful appeal could still see the houses build but without the benefit of the funding ! Sometimes you have to make a choice.

Finally

It's been an extremely busy year and much has passed yet so much more will come again next year, so for now I hope you all have a great Christmas and New Year, hope the weather isn't as bad a last winter and wish you all health and happiness. **Bob Evans MDDC Lower Culm**

COMMONWEALTH WAR GRAVES COMMISSION

After visiting war graves earlier in the year one of our residents wrote to the CWGC and would like to share the response received. "Many thanks for your kind letter of 20 August which has been passed to me for reply. As you have observed when visiting our sites, a huge amount of work goes into keeping the graves, cemeteries, memorials, records and planting in order.

What many people perhaps do not realise is that horticulture has always been an essential part of our commemoration of the war dead and that, with the equivalent of almost 1,000 football pitches to mow each week, the CWGC is probably the world's largest gardening organisation! Your readers may be keen gardeners and measure their borders at home in metres, but we measure ours in kilometres! We were also one of the first organisations to mass purchase and develop the petrol-powered lawnmower and we still work with suppliers and manufacturers to develop machinery that might eventually filter its way down to the domestic gardener.

The vast majority of our 1,300 staff worldwide are gardeners and stone masons, almost 900 in fact, and some are even the third generation of their family to work for us. It is not uncommon to find that a particular group of gardeners might have experience that amounts to well over 100 years of gardening know how.

We employ a mix of UK and local staff around the world and as an employer, we are committed to the professional development of our gardening staff - with many UK gardeners having formal horticultural qualifications. Local staff with no formal qualifications undertake modular training, covering all aspects of horticultural work in a cemetery, which allows them to progress through the grading structure on successful completion of modules.

The Commission's horticulture is carefully managed to contribute to the aesthetic value of the sites, as intended from the earliest days, to give the effect of a garden, achieving a sense of peace in a beautiful and serene setting, thus bearing witness to the sacrifice of those who lie there. The cemeteries are laid out to a more or less standard plan, with headstone borders planted with herbaceous perennials and floribunda roses, with plants selected to provide variety in texture, height and timing of floral display and with low shrubs at the ends of the rows. These rows are set in lawns to provide an appropriate setting to these headstone borders – the absence of any paths contributes to the simplicity of design of the cemeteries as a whole. Other horticultural features, such as trees, shrubberies, hedges and sometimes pergolas, contribute to the architectural layout of a cemetery, helping to give interest, form and coherence to the design, in addition to providing shelter, obscuring unwanted sights and defining boundaries. Where water is a scarce resource or in short supply, we adapt our approach to suit local climatic conditions - for example at the El Alamein War Cemeterv.

In effect, we see the cemeteries as not just places for the dead but for the living and the planting helps to both soften the look of our stonework and also create the right atmosphere in which to remember the dead. Our sites are moving but should not be gloomy.

WILLAND PARISH COUNCIL CHAIR - COMMENT & REPORT

I start with a tinge of sadness in that Councillor Tony Mander has retired from the parish council after many years of loyal service. He could not be persuaded to stay but is to be available to the village community with his commitment to the Composting site and involvement in other projects. Thank you again Tony. Our Clerk will report elsewhere on the procedures to replace Tony on the parish council.

Those of you who watch the parish website and the Facebook page will have seen that the MDDC Planning Committee has refused to grant permission for the 125 houses off Meadow Park but they did approve the creation of an entrance for housing development. As the Local Plan Review allows for 42 houses on the site over the plan period to 2033 that decision is logical. If approval was given for the houses there was to be money available for the Primary School, The Gables project to fit out the proposed community facilities and to improve the BMX track or other trim trail or play facilities. This would have been of benefit to the village BUT the money would not have been available until the start of the development and that could be a few years hence and by then the monies probably would not cover the costs of work itemised in the offer. Willand has no proven need for all these extra houses, which would include 44 more affordable homes on top of those already built and being built alongside the B3181. The decision was a question of balance and from a Parish Council perspective, the correct decision was made. We may still end up with them as the applicant has the option to appeal. More houses for Willand is still on the table as other developers are sounding out the councils to assess their likelihood of success with other potential application. Watch the website please www.willand-pc.org.uk and make your views known. We are not mind readers on the Parish Council! If you have a view write in at the appropriate time as it is numbers which count when gauging opposition or support for an application.

The Inspector examining the Local Plan held hearings on 20 and 21 September regarding the J27 part of the plan together with the two housing sites linked to it. Willand Parish Council were able to put their view and two residents also received a hearing. Our Ward Councillor Bob Evans also joined us and made some very robust arguments which questioned the need and soundness of the proposal. The Inspector hopes to report on this aspect of the plan by the end of October and so we may know the result by the time you receive the magazine. Watch the Website or Facebook for updates.

More play/fitness equipment has gone into the Jubilee Field for the use of all age groups - that is if you can get anywhere near it when the children come out of school. It is wonderful to see so much use being made of it. Thanks must go to our County Councillor Ray Radford who worked with the Parish Council to get a grant for the bulk of the cost from 'Investing in Devon Local Project Fund'. We also thank James Marshall for his advice and enthusiasm. He now tells us that the Mums and Dads need somewhere to sit whilst the children play and so with a case put forward by James and letters of support from the Primary School and Pre-school Heads and Richard Chesterton, one of our Ward Councillors, we have put forward an application for some funding from the 'Communities Together Fund'. If we are successful in getting the funding then watch out for some seating in the New Year. A lot of people are working to make the area more attractive and exciting to visit yet there are still some dog owners not clearing up as the men putting up the new equipment had to pick up two lots before they could start. Please do not leave litter and if you see it please put it in one of the bins.

You may have noticed the new fencing along the Orchard Way play area which has been provided by Mid Devon District Council in preparation for leasing that area to the Parish. Once the lease is complete we will be looking for funding to put in some new equipment, ideally a large piece for the older children. Get your thinking caps on as to where we can find about £10,000. Any local businesses feeling generous please?

In the last magazine we spoke of some questionable activities going on around the shelter in the Jubilee Field. The police have been involved and we have some residents who have entered into dialogue with one or two individuals. Please keep an eye on things as we do not want to lose the facilities which have resulted from a lot of commitment by some to achieve. Do remember some of the area is covered by CCTV.

A number of residents are now contacting us about uncut hedges, possible dangerous trees, garden plants encroaching over pavements, dodgy fences, noisy burglar alarms after power cuts and more. The Parish Council has no powers to deal with a lot these things direct but we do approach people and seek their cooperation. If everyone looks after their own patch or helps a less able neighbour all will be well. If that does not work we refer the matter to the relevant Council but they have set procedures and it takes time to resolve. Most things can be resolved but the time it takes can be frustrating. If you want frustration come and be a parish councillor and then you will really experience it on occasions. Did I mention we have a vacancy?

If I do not get the opportunity before may I wish you a Happy and Peaceful Christmas – yes its coming but not seen the Easter Eggs in the shops yet! Keep well and working for our community and please stay safe whilst you do it. Every little helps. Remember the best response is "How can I help". It is so much better than "What's in it for me." ST. MARY'S RESTORATION APPEAL – Update Report September 2018

Once again I am pleased to be able to report continuing success with our appeal for funds to restore our beautiful parish church in Willand. The Church's version of planning permission has been received and our architect is responding to some minor details that have been raised. Since my last report at the end of June, fundraising activities within the parish have raised a further £738 and we are looking forward to our evening with the Wyndham Singers on the 20th October.

We have received generous grants of £3,000 from the Allchurches Trust and \pounds 1,000 from the Devon County Council Locality Budget bringing our total receipts, including £4,000 payable after work starts, to £41,000. This is well

over the 50% mark that has enabled us to apply for a grant from the Garfield Weston Trust. Finally, we have been informed that Willand's application to Viridor Credits for a major grant from the Landfill Tax has passed through all stages and I will be meeting their representative shortly to provide an up to date report on the work that is required.

Results of both these applications are expected by the end of this month, which we are hoping will bring our target down to under £10,000 at which stage the PCC would be in a position to commit to signing the builder's contract. However, even with this perhaps rather optimistic assessment, it is clear that there will be a continuing need for further fundraising, but this would continue whilst the work was in progress.

I cannot emphasise too strongly how grateful we all are, PCC, congregation and members of our community of Willand, for these most generous contributions, large or small, that will, with the Lord's help, enable us to restore our cherished church and to safeguard its future now and for generations to



come. WILLAND HISTORY GROUP

Firstly, a correction to the last History Group article: Derek Rowe had told us that William Clist was the blacksmith at the Halfway House smithy, and not Charlie Clist (apologies for the misprint!); as Derek points out, Charlie Clist was in fact William Clist's son. The History Group held a successful AGM in October, when we decided it was high time to come out of 'dormancy'. Several future

activities were discussed, including a 'Parish Walk' to be held in spring 2019, exploring Willand's historic sites, and recording the many changes. Towards the end of 2019 we plan to hold an Exhibition based loosely on the theme of 'Changing Willand', but showcasing material we have in the Willand Archive. Other projects were discussed, such the county-wide Devon Place-Name Project (recording things like field names, or even 'folk names' that might never otherwise be recorded – Toy-town for example!), or developing our own project to document the changing face of farming in Willand over the last century (from livestock and arable, to solar power and bio-digesters!).

We would love it for more people to get involved, so if you have any interest in Willand's past, or local history in general, please do get in touch. Enthusiasm and new ideas are most welcome, but your level of involvement is up to you, even it is just coming along to meetings for a chat and a listen. We plan to meet again in early 2019, so if you are interested, let us know your details and we'll be in touch to confirm contact details below.

At the kind invitation of Halberton History Group, in September we attended a talk given by millwright and archaeologist Martin Watts at Halberton Village Hall, on 'Watermills in the Devon Landscape'. He gave great insight into the history of watermills in our locality, adding to our understanding of Willand's mills. For example, in the Domesday Survey of 1086 it is recorded that Willand had one mill, which would have been a water-powered corn grinding mill. It has been speculated that this mill could have been at one of Willand's two later mills sites, Weir Mill or Summers Mill. However, Mr Watts explained that such early water mills were 'relatively ephemeral structures' not dissimilar to 'garden sheds on stilts' and we should not expect their locations to correspond with later sites. One local water mill mentioned was Selgars Mills, a corn mill on the Culm to the north of Willand, which burnt down in 1889; unusually, it was completely rebuilt as a water-powered mill at time when across the country mills were transitioning to steam power.

On 11 November it will be 100 years since the signing of the Armistice that ended the First World War. On that day in 1918, the news first reached Willand through Tiverton Junction Railway Station not long after 11 a.m. Engine whistles were blown and 'detonators' discharged, and the hooter at Cullompton Paper Mills could be heard blowing continuously. The children of Willand School were given a half day holiday, as were workers at Duchess of Devonshire Dairy, and church bells could heard ringing across the district.

At that same time, Willand farmer's son Reg Rowe (serving on the Western Front with the 2nd Devons) was seriously ill, admitted to hospital with influenza – the notorious 'Spanish flu' that claimed so many lives in 1918/19. Thankfully, he pulled through, and by the time the Armistice was signed he was back in England, at a hospital in Cambridge. He wrote to his mother back in Willand that, "I left the battalion with this rotten Spanish Flue [sic], and before I reached the base it had developed into 'Bronchial Pneumonia'. I am getting on A1 now, but it was a toss up the other side if I should come to Blighty or remain in France

for good. I left the battalion on Oct 29. We went over the top a couple of days before but we failed to reach the objective. Had to cross a river and canal. Crossed the river all right but the canal was one mass of machine guns. This place is a ... beastly military hospital and not the best of those. The food is good but I have taken a dislike to it ... Hurrah now the war is over. Hope to be with you as a civilian again shortly." Reg Rowe arrived home after demobilisation in March 1919.

Meanwhile, back in Willand, on the evening 11 November 1918, the Parish Church was packed for a service of thanksgiving. Revd Andrews gave a stirring sermon, and later wrote in the church magazine: "Our hearts are full of grateful thanksgiving to God for the cessation of hostilities and the preparations for peace ... Now is the time to think furiously of the tremendous work of reconstruction – which awaits to be done." **James Morrison, 01884 250057** (jamorrison235@gmail.com)
