WILLAND PARISH COUNCIL

Let us start with some good news for most. As the result of representations made to the Parish Council you will see the footpath through the Jubilee Parish Field has been widened and resurfaced. This was paid for mainly from monies which were put back for enhancements to the field and a sum of money held by MDDC which had been collected from monies paid by builders of new houses within the village. An approach to DCC only resulted in us being told to ask the school to pay. The Parish Council would not do that as the school budget is under enough strain already. The path will allow people to pass one another easier, be better for buggies, wheel chairs and the like without having to go on the grass. It may mean some tolerance and patience being shown if the scooters and skateboards like the slight downhill gradient.

On the subject of the Jubilee Field it may be opportune to remind people that this is a community asset for use by the community. Certain organisations are seeking to use it for fundraising events and other village organisations would like to use it for fun days or similar events. This is making good use of the asset and no charge has been made to date although permission should be sought from the Parish Clerk as there are insurance issues. Some are bringing vehicles onto the field and we must ensure that no damage is caused to the surface by tyres or oils as at the end of the day it is for play. We did pour cold water on the idea of the fun fair going on there.

Grass cutting is still a concern within the village and several issues have been raised by the Parish Council and residents with our DCC and MDDC Councillors. Things are not totally right but in the main MDDC seem to be getting most areas under control. Hopefully some progress will be made to get on top of some of the hedges and growth that is obstructing the width of footpaths in places. Our thanks to ward Councillor Bob Evans who has tried to help things along by emailing and speaking to officers. Sadly, DCC are being DCC and we can all see the end result of their limited efforts. The Parish Council have arranged for a private contractor to come in and try and tidy things up a bit. They are not going to be able to work miracles at first visit as there is so much uncut long grass and weed. Where it has been cut we can all see the piles which have been left behind. To pay someone to clear up all the excess grass and remove it in one go would be too costly.

To those residents who have cut verges and overgrown vegetation in their areas we express a sincere thank you. Please keep it up but stay safe. This helps to keep areas of our village looking a bit better. A big thank you also to those volunteers who have planted up and weeded the flower beds as they are looking colourful at present.

In the last issue, the subject was raised as to the parish precept being raised in order to take on the grass cutting of the DCC areas of responsibility. The feedback has been very minimal so one has to take the view that no one has

any strong feelings. It will be discussed openly at our parish council meetings later in the year before the precept is set for next year so watch out for the agenda and if you have any views please let them be known.

Planning continues to be an issue with developers trying to take advantage of a government planning inspectors ruling that MDDC does not have a 5-year land supply. This seems to give developers an urge to try and apply to build houses on any bit of spare green land. There is plenty of approved land already but it seems that they do not want to build too many too quickly or else the price will go down — or is that me being cynical! Willand and the immediate area appears to be a prime target. More houses but little or nothing by way of improving the school and other village facilities. The bigger concern is the capacity of our roads to take the extra traffic as development this side of Cullompton and up the Uffculme straight are all going to contribute to increased traffic flows through the village.

Your Parish Council are making representations to appeal hearings in relation to another 30 houses on the Uffculme straight, the Local Plan at the end of September into the inclusion of Junction 27 for development and then in October the 259 houses between the village and the Esso Garage. At the time of writing no decision has been made by MDDC on the demolition and building 30 houses on the Esso Garage site. There is now an application to build 29 affordable homes on the field next to Ash Close. When you look at the detail a considerable number of the houses are for part ownership and so they will not be social rented properties as some may wish to indicate. Watch this space. If all this goes through the village will grow by over 20% with very little benefit to the village as a whole although no doubt some of our businesses will benefit.

Some dog owners are still letting their charges foul and are not clearing it up. The boss of the firm who did the work on the footpath managed to step in a pile right by the school gate. Rather him than one of the children but why should it be anyone. I watched a person enter the field with two dogs and they were let run. Whilst one was thrown a ball to chase the other was left to its own devices, visited all the posts for the trim trail and then went and peed on the slide as well. No control at all. There is a sign asking for dogs to be kept on leads but then I suppose it does not apply to some. How do you control four or five dogs when you let them off the leads and they go in all directions?

Moan over! But I have been taken to task for drawing attention to failings of certain council departments in some instances. Apparently some would have us believe that they are faultless and if they are wrong I should not say so. They seem to forget when I have made a point of praising individuals who have done a good job. Keep smiling Christmas will soon be here. **Barry G J Warren**

WILLAND HEALTH AND COMMUNITY CENTRE THINGS ARE HAPPENING!

The Trustees are pleased to announce some exciting news regarding the progress of the new Health & Community Centre project.

After many months of discussion, rethinking and attracting new Trustees, the project is now making excellent progress. A fresh building design has been proposed which some of you may have already seen together with a different floor layout. A number of local architects have been invited to tender for the work stages from conception to completion, and several bids have been submitted. From these a short list of three will be selected with the final successful architect being decided by the Trustees.

Additionally, new volunteer fund raisers have joined the management team. They each bring their own expertise to the challenging requirement of raising funds for the ongoing expenditure, and the all-important funding from grant agencies/societies to cover the main construction works, which is expected to be circa £800K. Application is being prepared for submission to the Major funders, part of the application concerns support from the Willand community, in consequence:

In order to make the application for funding the construction of the new Willand Health & Community Centre, we have to demonstrate to the society providing the funds, that the WH&CC has the support of the people of Willand.

We would like to welcome Mr Michael Hollings as a trustee. He has already proved himself an asset to the hall, with a number of good suggestions. We do still have some more vacancies for trustees if you are interested.

We have put a comments book in the kitchen. If you have any comments, complaints or suggestions (no rude ones please!), please put them down and we will see if we can help.

Our new doors are very secure, but are quite complicated to lock, because of new fire regulations. Please let one of us know if you need some instructions. We are asking users to come in via the front door now, unless the side rooms are being used at the same time as the main hall.

The Parish Council has agreed to fund installation of WiFi and its running costs for two years, so it will be put in as soon as we have received quotes. The connection will be very slow, as there is no capacity left in Willand for fibre connection. We will be monitoring its use to see if it is a viable proposition after the two years, as it will cost around £300 per annum to run.

We will be having some new lighting installed in the entrance hall, to make it a bit more welcoming. The internal hall doors should be fitted in October; then we will have the hall decorated, all of which costs a lot of money. Frances Wilcox is running monthly bingos to help funds. The next one is on 12th September, so why not come along? We have cash prizes for 10 games, 2 games with meat dinner prizes and a flyer with higher cash amounts.

The steps to the stage have handles fitted to the bottom riser for moving them without damaging the floor. Instructions were stapled securely to the steps, but someone has removed them. Whoever did this, please do not do it again, once new ones have been fitted.

CELEBRATION TREES

On the grass triangle opposite the Bluebell Restaurant is a Tulip tree planted nearly 50 years ago. The plaque is still there to show the planting of this special tree was to celebrate our Queen's silver jubilee. In June this year there were many pale yellow tulip-shaped flowers on the tree, a sight worth seeing.

Three Autumn Flowering Cherry trees were planted in 2012 to celebrate our Queen's diamond jubilee. One of the trees was planted at Willand Primary School and it has a plaque beneath it, and one was planted on the grass triangle referred to above, and one near the phone box in Silver Street. They are all thriving and hopefully the white blossom in autumn will be more profuse as they mature.

Meadow Park Wood (planted as a shelter belt for the original Gables)

Try and make sure to visit this wood which is in three parts. The entrance to the main part is in Meadow Park, and you are welcomed by an ancient Maple tree. The wood is owned and managed by the Woodland Trust on the basis of natural regeneration; you can see the under-storey growing up to replace the mature trees. Trees growing there include Ash, Oak, Wild Cherry, Sycamore and many Hornbeam (unusual in South West woodland). Around the adjoining field you will see ancient Oak trees in the hedges, a feature of the setting of Old Willand. Please support the Woodland Trust (a charity) in their management of our woodland and many others across the country.

Would you like to volunteer to be the next tree warden?

There are thousands of volunteer tree wardens throughout the country, supporting Parish and Town Councils to promote the appreciation and value of trees. I have reached the time to hand over to someone else after several worthwhile and enjoyable years as Willand volunteer tree warden. WILLAND HISTORY GROUP

The History Group recently received a query as to why the four houses of Parkfield Terrace on Station Road (built in 1890) are only numbered 3 to 6. Of course, there used to be another two houses, numbers 1 and 2, but these were demolished when the M5 Motorway was built in 1974/75. It is worth remembering that before housing developments filled in the gaps in Willand parish, Parkfield Terrace was once part of the settlement known as Tiverton Junction, which had grown up during the 1800s around the railway station of the same name (the station was located on the site now occupied by the vehicle yard on Lloyd Maunder Road). After the station was built in 1844, a long row of cottages was built opposite by local businessman, John Quant; at one end was a large house called Parkfield House, and the other end was the Railway Hotel (later Railway Inn). All of these were also demolished to make way for the motorway.

Before its demise, the Railway Inn was a popular Willand pub, often filled by market day farmers visiting the Tiverton Junction Livestock Market further up Station Road (now Market Place). Behind the pub was the Assembly Room, a

small hall accessed by a wooden staircase, which for many years served as a venue for dances, meetings, fund-raising events, club dinners, dramatic performances, and much more. During the Second World War it was used as an overspill classroom for Willand School, which had had its numbers bolstered by evacuees from Ilford School in Essex. Whenever dances were held there, the hall had to be reinforced by extra props downstairs in the skittle alley – such were the vigorous gyrations of exuberant Willanders, some of whom had no doubt been lubricated at the bar next door.

The late Joan Cotterill (nee Keen) recalled the Assembly Room in the 1930s when it, "was a very busy place with whist drives, Scout and Guide shows and special parties. New Year's Eve was extra special and most of the village would attend. We were allowed to stay up late until the Old Year was seen out by a boy dressed up as Old Father Time who went out through the hall whilst the clock was striking and then a little girl dressed up in a pretty white sparkly dress came in at the end of the last twelve strokes depicting the New Year. Then we all sang Auld Lang Syne and off home to bed."

Another function of the Assembly Room was as venue for Coroners inquests. For example, in January 1916 it hosted the inquest into the death of Fred Sayer, chief reporter of the *Tiverton Gazette*. He had been returning from Cullompton to Tiverton in the sidecar of a motorcycle ridden by 16 year-old Norman Parminter. As the motorcycle rounded the blind corner opposite Willand Methodist Chapel at the top of Gables Road (the notorious Woodlands Corner) it was confronted by an approaching traction engine. Parminter braked sharply. Sayer was thrown from the sidecar. As Sayer lay stunned in the road the wheel of the traction engine unavoidably crushed his head, killing him instantly. The body was carried to the Assembly Room, where the inquest was held later that afternoon by District Coroner Gould in front of a jury hastily made up of local men. After hearing evidence from several witnesses the jury returned the following verdict: "We find that it was a pure accident, and we attach no blame to anyone." The brick wall on that corner was later remodelled to allow much better visibility.

It was a hundred years ago, in September 1917, that Lance-Corporal Anthony Beer, a 'son of Tiverton Junction', had a lucky escape on the Western Front whilst serving with the Canadian Expeditionary Force; he had emigrated to Ontario, Canada, in 1911, although his parents still lived at 1 Parkfield Terrace. The *Devon & Somerset News* related with dramatic effect how, "He volunteered with three pals to rescue a wounded comrade in No Man's Land. Shrapnel from the enemy's guns was falling fast and thick, as the brave lads were about to start on their desperate venture, and, knowing not what fate might have in store for them, they read a chapter from the Holy Book, offered prayer, and sang the hymn 'Jesus, Saviour, pilot me'. The night was dark and Death was hovering near. Almost immediately one fell lifeless; then another, and another. Beer was left alone. He succeeded in reaching the wounded man, and conveyed him within fifty yards of the British lines when he himself was struck by shrapnel.

Crawling along cautiously, he reached a dug-out, which was full of German soldiers, wounded, dying and dead. There he remained for 24 hours until the ambulance men found him, and brought him back into a dressing station."
