VILLAGE HALL CLOCK

The clock on the village hall was bought by the Parish Council at the time of the Millennium, but it has become clear in recent years that it is no longer able to keep to time. It would appear that there are a number of reasons for this and they include the fact that the radio transmitter that provided the updates was moved up to Cumbria and the clocks in Devon now find it difficult to maintain a signal. Another issue is that the technology is out of date and no longer made so that it is difficult and expensive to maintain the parts and to update them. The Parish Council have been told that it will cost a minimum of £2,000 to update the clock so that it will keep time. On-going maintenance costs have not been estimated. On the whole it is felt that it would be better to remove the clock altogether and make good the outside of the hall but the Councillors are mindful that others may wish to see it preserved. If you feel strongly either way, please contact one of the Councillors or email the Clerk to let them know. The clock will continue to be erratic until a final decision is made as to what to do.

WILLAND VILLAGE HALL

Firstly, I would like to pay tribute to Joan Levett, who died recently. Joan was instrumental in the building of Willand Village Hall, was Treasurer for many years, then Chairman. When her ill health made it difficult to attend meetings, she was made President, and helped as much as she could in supporting the Hall. Joan was passionate about the Hall and, when she was in good health, did all she could to support us. The attendance at Joan's funeral is a testament to the respect in which she was held. Her £500 legacy will help towards our refurbishment in August.

We would like to say a huge thank you to Viridor (formerly Uffculme Environmental) for the grant of £45,000 towards our roof and hall floor replacement. We have also received smaller grants of £1000 from the Leonard Laity Stoate Trust and £500 from the Viscount Amory Trust, as well as £500 from Willand Tennis Club, £1000 from Willand Youth Club, £100 from a Willand resident, £100 from Rotary and £48 from Willand Garden Club. We are still waiting for replies from some other grant funding organisations, but are still short of about £25,000 to get all of the work done. We are appealing to all organisations and individuals who use the Hall to consider making a donation - however small or large – so we can get all the work done in one go, rather than waiting several more years. Donations can be sent to me at 4, Orchard Way, dropped in the post box at the Hall or given to one of the trustees. Please help, as the Hall is a valuable community asset and we need to keep it in good repair. The Blackheart concert on 20th May, was not too well attended, but did make a small profit, which will go towards the refurbishment. Thank you to those who helped on the evening.

At our AGM, John Crocker was re-elected Chairman, Frances Wilcox booking secretary and Carol Allan Treasurer. We still have some vacancies for trustees. WORTH WAITING FOR!

Spring this year has seemed slow to arrive, but approaching Willand from Cullompton the scene was a picture of colour! The area was covered with bright yellow daffodils and the pink of the Cherry blossom, even Devon banks covered with primroses. What an impact! Soon the flowering of Ladies' Smock on the village verges (a white/slightly pink flower above the grass) was a delight due partly to the lack of early grass cutting - regrettably soon overtaken by neglect of grass cutting!

Coming soon - Tulip tree in flower

Across the road from the Bluebell Restaurant there is a triangle of grass with special trees including the Tulip tree. This tree was planted for the Queen's Silver Jubilee nearly 40 years ago. It should be in flower by July, pale yellow tulip shaped flowers. Only one branch flowered last year, following the necessary

removal of the top of the tree to avoid power lines. The large unusual leaves are worth seeing even if the tree is not in flower.

The Gables shelter belt

The late Dr Tracey built a house called "The Gables" in the early 1900's and planted a shelter belt. This is now known as Meadow Park Wood. This woodland is managed by the Woodland Trust in three sections - one small area is beside Maple Close, and another is between Beech Close and Silver Street. The residents of the new houses at The Gables and Ash Close may find this of particular interest as they live nearby.

Meadow Park Wood

The main part of the wood is approached from the Meadow Park entrance and is well worth a visit. There is a great variety of trees and the wood is unusual in the South West, as Hornbeam trees are one of the main species. From the entrance there are two paths, and where they meet again in the wood is a magnificent Hornbeam with twin trunks, just beyond is a fine wild Cherry also with twin trunks. Note the very different trunks and bark of each tree. The woodland is managed on the basis of natural regeneration, and it is good to see many young trees at various stages of growth. The Woodland Trust inspects the wood regularly and removes dangerous and old trees when necessary. For any dog walkers there are dog bins conveniently situated outside the wood by Silver Street, and in Meadow Park to the left of the main entrance as you leave the wood. The Woodland Trust is a charity worthy of your support. Try and get out and about this summer, and enjoy your local patch! David Ritchie Voluntary tree warden

WILLAND CYCLE CLUB

The club was formed over a year ago for local cycling enthusiasts of all ages and abilities. Our driving force has been Chris Williams, who had earlier noticed many solo riders on the roads around Willand and wondered if the formation of a local group might be of interest.

He has been proved right and membership of the club is slowly growing with rides now arranged for mainly three groups of riders:

- Those who like to go out at a reasonably fast pace on roads for up to two hours.
- Several members prefer a slower pace with rides of perhaps twenty miles or less.
- Plodders, like me, who often combine parts of the Grand Western Canal, with local, quieter lanes at a pace that is not important.

These are not rigid arrangements and outings are planned to suit the riders turning up and the weather conditions at the time.

There are now regular rides on Tuesday evenings, generally starting at 6 pm and on Sundays at 10.30 am, both starting at the Village Hall, as well as impromptu outings that are posted regularly on the club Facebook page, which is our chosen medium for communication. Some rides have a coffee stop somewhere along the route chosen.

Over the past few months, active members have also met together for the odd social drink at "The Halfway House" to discuss how best the club should move forward and a very informative bike maintenance evening has also taken place, where the mysteries of bike mechanics and servicing have been revealed by more knowledgeable members. How many of us present realised there were simple devices for cleaning chains and for checking their unwelcome wear, for example?

It is perhaps an appropriate time to invite anyone in the Willand area who owns a bike and wants to keep fit in the company of others, to make contact and join one of our very friendly rides. It should be emphasised that no-one ever gets left behind as the pace of every outing is set to accommodate the ability of the slowest rider and if mechanical problems or punctures happen, then everyone waits and helps while the trouble is fixed. Also, there are no membership fees or other charges, everything is free!

We hope also that in time, we will be able to see younger members riding out in groups, perhaps with parents and with the encouragement of current members in attendance.

A LETTER FROM COUNTY COUNCILLOR RAY RADFORD Dear Residents

As with all local Authorities, we have our annual meeting to start a new year. There have been a few changes at County Hall for me. I am now the Chairman of the Place Committee, which basically deals with all environmental issues, including waste management/ highways/libraries, etc... But my main responsibility is to look after the residents in my division, Willand, Uffculme, Culmstock, Hemyock and Clayhidon in the Culm Area, as well as six other Parishes north of the M5.

The Government have allocated a pothole action fund of nearly £2m for the whole of County. It will only enable us to deal with a limited number of sites. I will be invited to work with our local Neighbourhood Highway Officer, Willy Pike, on prioritising schemes in our area.

South West Highways contract comes to an end now and work on a new contract for interested parties continues. Initial Tenders have been received and are currently being evaluated. The work is taking place with partner authorities, Devon, Somerset and Plymouth. A report is due to be presented to Cabinet in September which will update Members on the tender process and seek approval to award the contract soon after, so that the contractor has 6 months to mobilise prior to taking on responsibility for works delivery in April 2017.

The new Highway Safety policy was approved by Cabinet on 11th May, it's definition of a defect is largely unchanged. A risk matrix is used to decide the response to a defect, but it remains the case that dangerous defects posing a high risk to pedestrians, cyclists and drivers will be made safe promptly. Delivery of the current year programme is going well. Information on programme of work has been published and you can use; Roadworks.org; to see planned works for Devon Highways and work by other organisations in your area.

We have tried to get a Road Warden Scheme up and running, not easy, for fixing minor carriageway potholes etc., using volunteers, currently being collated. The next steps are to update the guidance following the feedback so that Community Road Wardens can use it to deliver local priority work. Also, whilst a small amount of funding is being made available for Community Warden work, the scheme is to allow communities to do, or fund work themselves that the highway service can no longer afford to deliver because of budget cuts from Central government. Training will be available.

Please keep the recycling going, this helps reduce our land fill cost and brings in revenue for what we recycle, all be it lower than it was 2 years ago. Interesting, we in Devon are the 2nd highest quantity of residual waste, for a County, in the Country, 31st out of 32 Counties. The average for a County is currently 7% lower than Devon, which, for us equates to around £3.25m in collection and disposal costs. We need to try and do a little better. WILLAND PARISH COUNCIL Willand Magazine

Our new Editor is continuing to settle in and has the first edition under her belt and this edition will now be her second edition. We will soon be due for some subtle changes I am sure and it is very important that we all read what it contains as it is only in this way that we will know what is going on in the village, particularly if you have only recently arrived or do not have access to the various social media. Sometimes the information is a little dated but our website and the Facebook pages do get the information out a little more quickly. I say this with good reason as we have been accused of not informing or consulting yet the information has been circulated by one of the above mentioned means or has been clearly displayed on one of our notice boards in minutes of meetings. It just has not been read.

Appearance of the Village

The Parish Clerk and Parish Councillors have received numerous calls and emails as to the state of the village and in particular the state of the grass cutting – or not cutting as the case may be. The situation was aggravated by some crossed wires at Mid Devon District Council [MDDC] as people answering calls were telling callers that it was entirely the Parish Councils' fault as we had opted out or were not paying MDDC to cut our grass [or words to that effect]. Hopefully some of that has now been rectified by a number of emails between the Parish Council and MDDC and the intervention of a couple of our Ward Councillors. The facts are that the Parish Council cut the grass for our half of the Jubilee Parish Field (behind the village hall and tennis courts) and the Cemetery. Devon County Council [DCC] is responsible for the grass on the roadside verges and MDDC is responsible for the rest which includes play areas, green open spaces and some grass banks on what was originally the 'council estates'. MDDC had a bit of a 'blip' and got behind with their grass cutting but hopefully they have had a purge and got on top of it again. The only minor problem is the 'finish' in the churchyard but Councillor Bob Evans is working on that one. We often moan about the actions [or non-actions] of some council officials and normally we do not hear names of officers responsible but praise where it is due. Andrew Busby, MDDC Estates Manager, picked up very quickly on our emails and concerns over the grass cutting and the misinformation which was getting out. He was sending out emails to other members of staff to get things corrected and for action to be taken and it was noted that some of the emails were timed guite late into the evenings. Dedication indeed and then we found out that he was actually on holiday – that is dedication.

The problem with the verges rests firmly with DCC and decisions made by them under the 'Tough Choices' policy. They decided to cut back the monies available for grass cutting which they paid to MDDC to cut the grass as their 'agents'. They were only to cut visibility splays and if anything else was required the Parish or Town Councils had to pay. DID YOU KNOW that Willand has over 34,000 square meters of grass which DCC are responsible for maintaining? This meant that Willand was asked to find over £11,000 to maintain what we had been getting. That would be a rise of another 25% on your council tax – DCC opts out and the Parish/Town gets the blame for the cost and if it is not done right. Willand and 8 other councils in Mid Devon declined to do this and advised that DCC should do the job in accord with their responsibilities. The bottom line is they did nothing for Willand until the Parish Council and a number of parishioners started bothering Councillor Ray Radford. Some grass was cut - I use the word very loosely small bits were left which make it look as if someone is being childish - some areas were left and those that were cut were NOT cut to specification and footpaths are left with grass over them which could become slip hazards for pedestrians, particularly the elderly. Other footpaths are left obstructed as the grass has not been cut at all. Dog owners are having trouble in finding the droppings and so we have potential for a health hazard. Our local Neighbourhood Highways Officer is not happy with the work that has been done and has had the workmen back at least once to try and improve the situation. You judge what it looks like - he has tried but is overruled from above no doubt! All this in the interests of saving money without regard to potential insurance claims for accidents as a car driver cannot see to pull out or people may slip on wet grass left on pavements. Not to mention the potential for surface water

flooding as the uncollected grass is left to block gutters and drains. Are they saving money when the men who did 'cut' the Willand grass allegedly came from the West Devon Area – that is Okehampton/Tavistock/Torrington?? To those of you who have always cut the verge by your house and those who have recently done a 'one off' cut as you could not bear to look at the mess or put up with the weed seeds blowing into your garden a very sincere thank you but please do not put yourselves in danger. Councillor Radford offered to make £1,000 available to the Parish Council from his Community Budget but that would pass the onus back to the Parish Council and we would have to ask residents to provide the other £10,000! IF YOU WANT THE PARISH COUNCIL TO TAKE OVER CUTTING THE GRASS VERGES AND PLIT UP THE PRECEPT BY AN AVERAGE OF £7.60p PER

VERGES AND PUT UP THE PRECEPT BY AN AVERAGE OF £7.60p PER HOUSEHOLD TO PAY FOR IT PLEASE WRITE TO THE CLERK. IT WILL NEED ABOUT 750 HOUSEHOLDS TO SIGN UP TO ACHIEVE A MAJORITY.

If you are not happy with DCC service regarding grass cutting please express your views to our local DCC Councillor Ray Radford. His contact details are in the magazine. If you want to be sure who is responsible for an area of grass which is of concern to you talk to me as I have the maps which show the areas of responsibility.

Planters/Flower Beds

The planters were getting lost in the long DCC grass and so their future was in doubt. In spite of requests only three volunteers came forward in addition to John Holmes who has been planting them up twice a year on his own until now. Now that the decision has been made to remove the remainder more volunteers have come forward and so all planters will be retained except the one nearly opposite One Stop in Station Road which no one appears interested in retaining. A very big and sincere thank you to those who have come forward to look after the planters. Please make sure that our Clerk has your contact details and then John will liaise with you to order the plants which the Parish Council buys in bulk to reduce cost.

Play Areas

We still await the lease from MDDC for the Parish Council to take on responsibility for the rest of the Jubilee Parish Field although we have a letter of intent. Our Ward Councillors have given the new Chief Executive a tour of the village and he was well briefed and saw the difference in maintenance between what the Parish look after and what MDDC provide. Many thanks to those who have volunteered to help look after the Worcester Crescent and Mallow Court Play Areas. I have a feeling that Worcester Crescent has already been taken over by residents and the Brownies have also been cleaning the play equipment. We are seeking funding from Tesco for more play equipment on the Parish Field and so if you get a chance later in the year please vote for Willand. We are in early stages of obtaining some challenging equipment for the 8 – 14 year olds

which will give an obstacle type course next to the current play area on the Jubilee Field. We have the money for that once we have convinced suppliers to come up with a sensible price.

Discussions are continuing to provide a night landing spot in the village for the Air Ambulance. Some local businesses have already indicated support. We have not approached anyone for fundraising as yet but the Willand Theatrical Society has already kindly held an event to raise some funds. It was a good night at the bingo as I have three bottles of wine and a box of rather fattening chocolate biscuits to prove it.

Planning

The latest version of the Local Plan is predicted to go before MDDC Cabinet in September if there are no further delays. If there are any major changes recommended then there will be a further 6 - 8 weeks delay for more public consultation.

The agents for potential developers have been and seen the Parish Council in relation to the 250 to 300 houses off Meadow Park. No real substance or detail as yet and so more information is awaited.

Discussions between MDDC and the applicants for development at Junction 27 continue. All a big secret as to detail and so there is no more to tell.

We have no further information as to what is to happen about the proposed Co-op on the Mid Devon Business Park. The Solar Park on the field entering the village from Cullompton is understood to be seeking funders before it can start.

If you wish to know any more or we have missed anything please contact the Clerk or a Councillor. Please remember to do your bit to ensure growth of hedges or weeds do not obstruct footpaths even if DCC do not stick by the rules. **Barry G J Warren. Chair of Willand Parish Council**

WILLAND HISTORY GROUP

There is not much to report since the last magazine, although we still plan to hold a 'Parish Walk' on an evening later this summer, probably in August. This will take the form of an informal tour of the village to record some of the more recent changes and take in some of Willand's historic sites – this year the theme will be 'The Old Farms of Willand'. One 'Old Farm of Willand' we may pass is Coombe Farm, although perhaps 'lost farm' would be more accurate, as there is virtually no evidence that it was ever there. It was located on the gradient going up from the main road into the Old Village, on the left hand side, just past the turning to Orchard Way and before Beaufoy House. The name probably dates to at least the early-1600s when it was associated with the Coombe family, who were yeoman farmers in the village; a 1610 document records that Robert Coombe was churchwarden and constable for the parish. The farm had various owners and occupiers from the 1700s to early-1900s - including the Rowes for a short while - but from 1912 was farmed by Edwin Maunder, who also ran a 'pork merchant' business at Tiverton Junction; his brother was Lloyd Maunder, who established his abattoir there. Tragically, Edwin Maunder was killed in 1932 when struck by a passing lorry whilst he was shepherding a small flock of sheep along the new 'Willand Bypass' (which bypassed the Old Village), not far from his farm. The farm itself also suffered disastrous bad luck, firstly in 1919 when the barn and stable were destroyed by a fire caused a spark from a passing traction engine igniting the recently replaced thatch, and then in 1945 when another fire destroyed the thatched farmhouse and labourer's cottage (the adjoining Beaufoy House was saved). The farm itself was never rebuilt, although Edwin Maunder's son-in-law, Jack Webber, later farmed the Coombe lands, until the 1980s when they were developed as the Orchard Way housing estate. The actual site of the farmhouse, yard and outbuildings became a tennis court for some years, until the private residence 'Coombe Court' was built there.

The latest First World War battle to have its centenary commemorated is the momentous battle of the Somme, a battle indelibly seared on the national conscience. On the first day, 1 July 1916, the British Army suffered 57,470 casualties of whom 19,240 were killed. One of those young men who lost his life was Harry Dunn, born in Willand in 1892, son of William and Ellen Dunn, who lived in one of the cottages on Silver Street. Harry later left Willand for Culmstock, where he worked as a farm labourer until he enlisted and joined 9th Battalion, Devonshire Regiment (his name appears on Culmstock's War Memorial, but not Willand's) On 1 July, the 8th and 9th Devons attacked near Mametz village with some limited success but heavy losses. The dead, including 24 year old Harry Dunn, were buried in a mass grave marked by a plaque reading '*The Devonshires held this trench, the Devonshires hold it still*'.

GRASS DEPOSITS

We ask that only freshly cut grass, that is grass mown within the preceding few days, is deposited on site.

It would seem that some residents are collecting their lawn clippings over a number of weeks which means that the bottom layer has become a soggy mess completely unsuitable for composting. We ask that people stop this as it is unreasonable to expect the volunteers working on the site to have to handle what has become an unhygienic mess.

NOTICE BOARD.

A notice board has been attached to the Composting site fence adjacent to North Jaycroft - near the traffic lights. This notice board is available for the community to display notices of events and information.

BAGS

We request that those who have had sieved compost return empty bags as soon as possible. Can we also remind residents that a considerable amount of effort is expended by our volunteers to produce bags of sieved compost at a very affordable price. It is not unreasonable to expect that <u>ALL</u> bags of compost are paid for.

FINALLY

To support the volunteers - please sort your garden waste and grass and deposit as separate items. This greatly assists in the composting process. We have noticed that there is an increasing amount of material other than grass being deposited in the grass collecting bins.
