# WILLAND PARISH COUNCIL

The time has come for me to put pen to paper again to advise you of what has been going on in the Parish. If I am lucky there may be some information as to what is going to happen. Hopefully you find it informative but I am sure that a number do not even look at the magazine. How do I know this – from questions we are asked which would not be asked if the questioner had read and absorbed the content. Let us start with some good news and perhaps go downhill from there!

#### COMMUNITY PAYBACK

In mid January we had another visit from teams having to carry out work for the benefit of the community as part of a court order. We are fortunate that again their work came at no cost to the Parish and the bill was picked up by Devon County Council. There were further footpaths which had vegetation cut back and leaves and other debris swept. Some other public areas were tidied and visibility improved on the Four Cross Way Roundabout. Thanks must also go to the volunteers of our Community Composting Scheme who dealt with quite a lot of the debris. The efforts of those residents who took the trouble to thank the teams for what they were doing is much appreciated and will help ensure that the scheme managers like coming back to Willand and we can get more done to try and keep our community tidy. Anyone with any ideas as to where else we may be able to use this facility should contact the Clerk or myself please and we will see what can be done. Health and safety considerations do place quite a lot of restrictions on some tasks.

# **DEVON AIR AMBULANCE – NIGHT LANDING**

The Parish has now received planning permission for this scheme to go ahead. Thanks to the generosity of Willand Theatrical Society and those who attended the Methodist Church Carol Service we have a goodly sum towards the cost of the mast and lights. We can make up the rest from savings we have made during the last year but if anyone else, individual, business or group would like to make a donation it would be gratefully received. We had a very generous offer from Matt Bright of D A Wright Electrical who was going to work with Diggerland to do a lot of the installation work for us which would have saved a lot of money. Things have moved on and the Devon Air Ambulance Trust has received a considerable sum from the government as the result of fines imposed on our sinning banking industry and they are now paying their preferred contractor to carry out the installations right around the County. In our case that amounts to about £2,700 but it does mean that we have to step back from Matt's generous offer. Hopefully the works will be carried out in a couple of months time if not sooner.

# PLAY EQUIPMENT

What do you do when your Devon County Councillor comes to you and advises that there is money available through an Investment in Devon programme which needs to be used before the end of the financial year? It has to be used for the benefit of the community health and wellbeing or recreation. What could we do quickly which could use this money for the benefit of the Parish but did not need too much 'topping up' from reserves. By the time you read this you should see the benefits of this with a nice big slide on the Jubilee Parish Field to add to the equipment provided earlier in the year. We hope it is well used and enjoyed. Thank you Councillor Ray Radford for thinking of Willand.

# PLAY AREA LEASES AND COSTS

You will recall that MDDC wished to close some of our small play areas and there was also a suggestion that they would sell off a portion of the Parish field by Gables Lea for housing. The Parish Council, with quite a lot of local support, decided to offer to save the areas by offering to take on the areas on a long term lease. In the end MDDC would only agree to a 25 year lease but agreed with all the rest of our suggestions. Other Parish and Town Councils have followed the 'Willand Model'. One of the deals was that MDDC dealt with all the legal work for the leases at no cost to the parish. It seems to have taken an age to get them prepared but at last they are with the Land Registry. We were advised to get advice from an independent solicitor and so if MDDC Legal Department are giving such advice to we 'volunteers' then you follow it. No mention that we would have to pay and we did not ask as we thought we had an agreement that MDDC was covering legal costs. We have a bill and certain officers and cabinet members of MDDC have declined to pay and used various 'interpretations' of simple words to leave Willand with the bill. Three members of the cabinet did not seem able to achieve a satisfactory way forward. Fortunately Ward member Bob Evans took up our case for us and approached a senior officer who was prepared to compromise and be practical. We will probably have to meet them half way! Thank you Bob - at least you took up the case. Watch the finance section of Full Council minutes to see the final outcome.

On the subject of the playing field behind the village hall does anyone know the identity of the inconsiderate person who is allowing a rather large dog to

defecate on the field and then not pick it up? You only have to see all the children using this area, particularly after school, to realise the dangers of this. The dog wardens/enforcement officers cannot be here all the time but we as residents are. The MDDC Enforcement Officers will now act on photographs or statements from witnesses. I know everyone is reluctant in one degree or another to get involved but in this particular case a stronger line needs to be taken please for the safety of our children. Do we really need to be forced into banning dogs from the field to protect the children? Come on responsible dog owners take the lead – no pun intended – but please do not become involved in any direct confrontation that will lead to a breach of the peace.

# OH NO DON'T PICK THE DAISYS

Well I think that is how the song went? The serious side is that someone has been spotted in the village digging up plants from the public banks or verges. Please do not do it as it deprives others from enjoying seeing them and you could be breaking the law in some circumstances.

#### PRECEPT 2016/2017

The precept has been set for the next year and the full detail will be reported elsewhere within the magazine. We have tried to keep it as modest as possible knowing that County and District Authorities are making cutbacks and attempting to push more responsibilities onto town and parish councils if we wish to maintain a reasonable appearance for our village and to provide some of the facilities which we take for granted which they now argue that they have no statutory responsibility to provide. Self help appears to be the order of the day. Our precept rise for the parish portion of your council tax is 4.65% but MDDC seem to make it a bit less. At the worst scenario we are looking at about £1.63p per house for the year in the village.

# MDDC LOCAL PLAN

By the time that you read this the local plan consultation period will have ended. Six weeks for 'consultation' starting on 3 January does leave one with the impression that they do not really want any real consultation as normally a consultation period is considered to be 12 weeks – see the NHS consultations. We had a presentation in Willand which was between 1500 & 1800 hours and comment was made by some that this was done to prevent those at work from being able to attend. At Willand the hall was not available later due to other bookings and repairs to the floor of the main hall were delayed as well. It will be noted that presentations in other areas were mainly during the day and so the availability of our hall may not have been a key factor. Sixty six people visited the presentation at Willand with five members of MDDC Planning staff in attendance. Of those attending there were certainly people there from Burlescombe and Cullompton so compared to a population of over 3,500 Willand interest seemed limited. Your Parish Council have done their best to submit a representative view on the plan and this can be seen by following the link on the Willand Matters website.

# PLANNING MATTERS

At the time of writing the application for outline approval for the 259 houses {Just remember that this started off as 300!} off Silver Street is still under discussion. There are recommendations for refusal from Devon County Council on highways and flooding concerns. MDDC Planners have also raised issues with regard to the proportion of affordable housing and green open space. The developers are pressing for more meetings with a view to 'persuasion' to remove the objections. The Parish Council has submitted a response and it is available to read on the website. Not too many of you have responded so we are not sure if we have it right.

The Co-Op proposal at Four Cross Way Roundabout has come to the fore again in that they are now asking for conditions to be changed to remove the need to provide a pedestrian crossing. It was the offer to include this crossing which originally persuaded the Planning Committee at MDDC to grant approval. There are arguments about criteria and the fact that the 'little book of words' used by DCC Highways does not require it. Bob Evans, one of our Ward Councillors is leading the argument to have a means of crossing in the area retained as a condition. Planning Officers say they cannot insist on its retention if DCC do not support it. A number of you have responded for which we are grateful to see. Once the store is open without a crossing then it will be a hard job to get one installed until we get a number of fatal accidents in the area. Do we really want to support a business that is carrying on like this to save about £20,000?

If it has not already happened it looks as if the Solar Panels on the field at the entrance to the village from Cullompton will soon appear. You will recall that MDDC refused the application and it was granted by a Government Inspector with certain conditions. The applicants now want to amend the conditions with some 'creative' explanations but if you look at it you will see that the bottom line is trying to find a less costly way of doing it.

# ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

Please put the date in your diary – Friday 24th March 2017. It will be in the main Village Hall and hopefully there will be a good representation from a number of our groups and organisations from within the village. The format will be similar to last year but we will gather a little later and start the formal meeting a bit earlier.

Any organisations who would like to have a table to advertise their organisation should contact the parish clerk (details in the front of the magazine)

Start time for the event :- Hall open at 18.30 for people to come in. There will be free tea, coffee and soft drinks and I am sure someone will bake a cake or two. The meeting will start at 19.00. Any organisation wishing to present a report for the past year will be welcome.

Please come and support the evening and meet with the Parish Councillors and hopefully Ward and County Councillors will manage to make it. It is your chance to ask questions and put views across. Constructive feedback is always appreciated and helpful otherwise how else do we know if we are representing the views of the village residents. The odd bit of abuse seems to come with the job but do remember we Councillors are volunteers where others cannot be bothered!

We still have vacancies for three Parish Councillors. Can you spare some time to help your community? Come and join us. It is interesting times!

## CARING FOR YOUR PET'S TEETH

Like humans, cats and dogs have a set of baby teeth that fall out and then have a set of adult teeth that need to last for the rest of their life!

Caring for these teeth will help ensure your pet doesn't suffer from any of the problems associated with poor dental hygiene :-

- Plaque and tartar.
- Swollen/painful gums, sometimes receding from the teeth leaving them loose or falling out.
- Bad breath, caused by bacteria (not nice for them or us!). In severe cases the bacteria can enter the blood stream, potentially damaging internal organs.

#### What can you do to help prevent dental disease? Brushing

We brush our teeth every day, so why not brush your pet's teeth too? There are many different pet toothbrushes and toothpastes available. Don't use your own toothpaste as this is not safe for pets. It is best to start brushing your pet's teeth from a young age so they learn to accept it; however, it is possible to start slowly and gently with an older pet too.

# Diet

Feeding a biscuit diet that your pet has to crunch on can help to keep the teeth clean. There are many specially formulated dental diets that contain everything your pet needs. Dental chews can be used to keep the teeth clean. Remember, these contain additional calories so reduce daily rations to allow for this.

#### Anti plaque water additives

It is possible to add a special solution to your pet's drinking water. This contains antibacterial agents and an ingredient that helps stop plaque and tartar formation. This can be purchased from your Veterinary Surgery.

#### **Dental treatment**

Sometimes it may be necessary for teeth to be cleaned at the vets. In order to examine the teeth and scale them, it is usually necessary for them to have a general anaesthetic. Some teeth may need to be removed during the procedure. This can be a lengthy and costly process and is not often covered by pet insurance.

So prevention is definitely better than the cure!

#### A Veterinary Nurse can check your pet's teeth (normally a free service), and will be able to advise you on the best dental care for your pet.

# AVIAN INFLUENZA (BIRD FLU) OUTBREAK IN THE UK

As you will be aware there have been a number of Avian Influenza outbreaks in the UK and a Prevention Zone was declared in December that covers all the UK.

The prevention zone means that all poultry keepers – whether on a commercial scale or simply a small backyard flock – are now required by law to house them (keep them under cover) or otherwise keep them separate from wild birds. This requirement (the Prevention Zone) has now been extended until 28 February 2017. Gatherings of poultry across the UK have also been banned.

It is also important that poultry keepers continue to keep a close watch on the health of their birds, and take steps to reduce the risk of infection via the environment, for example in wild bird droppings, by practising good biosecurity. You should do this even if your birds are inside. If they are concerned it is important that they contact their Vet.

This has been necessary because the same Avian Flu strain has also been found in wild birds in England, Scotland and Wales. DEFRA have taken this action to reduce the risks and help protect poultry and captive birds from avian flu.

Although we have been putting the message out on social media, not everyone uses or looks at a computer. So please help us to get this very important message to get out to everyone to raise awareness.

The Food Standards Agency advise that bird flu does not pose a food safety risk for UK consumers. Properly cooked poultry and poultry products, including eggs, are safe to eat.

DEFRA has produced a leaflet entitled "How to keep your birds safe from Avian Influenza (bird flu)".

# WILLAND VILLAGE HALL

At last our floor has been replaced and is looking good. Because of the bad weather on the continent, the first consignment was involved in a road accident, so the start was delayed a week. Please help this floor to last as long as the previous one by not dragging tables and chairs across it and by clearing up spillages as soon as they happen.

We still have a lot of work to do on the hall, including replacement of the doors, decoration of the main hall, cavity wall insulation and new, more efficient lighting. We do not have enough funds to do all this at once, so will be making a priority list and carrying out improvements as we get the funding.

We would like to thank all the organisations which have helped with funding for the roof and floor. They are too numerous to mention individually, but the main contributor was Viridor, which gave us over half of the money required.

Our CCTV system is showing that parents from the school are using the hall toilets before picking up their children. The toilets are for the use of people hiring the hall only, and are NOT public conveniences. Some of the parents have even been interrupting events going on at the hall to use the toilets. Please stop this.

The cameras also show some vehicles parking overnight. The Village Hall car park is a PRIVATE car park for use by users of the hall. Fosse Paving parked a pick up van there for three weeks over Christmas and it needed a call from the police to remove it. It belongs to a Willand resident who works for the company, so perhaps he will read this and take note that the police are aware.

In order to pay for further hall improvements and to bring our charges into line with nearby village halls, there will be an increase in hire charges from 1st April. Details will be in the next parish magazine.

#### LETTER FROM COUNCILLOR RAY RADFORD

#### Dear All

Hope you all had a great Xmas and now that the new year is well under way, it will be a good year for you.

Everything is going well for County, except for a few funding pressures we are facing. Various Council minutes will show how we have used the options

available to us to provide additional funding for Adult care. You will also see that utilising the additional 2% last year failed to meet our costs of the National Living Wages that care providers incurred so the short fall was met within the budget process. There will be options available to provide an increase in social care funding. This is a statutory duty on our behalf and we will balance the budget by the end of the year.

Devon County Council has introduced a recruitment freeze as it takes `firm action` to prevent a multi-million overspend. A job freeze has been introduced at DCC to help manage the overspend. In January, The Council projected an overspend by £8.1m by the end of the financial year, unless it takes firm action. A jobs freeze took effect immediately, but did not apply to posts where the Council would fail to meet it's statutory responsibilities if it did not recruit a replacement worker. We will take the firm action needed.

As you will be aware, as from 1<sup>st</sup> April 2017 County will have a new contractor, Skanska Construction UK Ltd, in place to deal with Highway, Public Footpaths and Pavements. There is a transitional period from Oct 2016 to 1<sup>st</sup> April 2017. As Chair of the Environment, I met with our Officers who are overseeing the transition to make sure that there are no unforeseen problems. They have fortnightly meetings and I am pleased to say that SWH have been very cooperative over this transitional period, which is credit to them, losing the contract, they could have made things difficult. The new Skanska contract will save us £980k in the next year.

Skanska are a very professional outfit employing about 25000 employees, there will be no disruption with the services and SWH will continue until 1<sup>st</sup> April. As far as the public are concerned, all we will notice is a different name on the 540 SWH employee's clothing, it will be a seamless transfer. SWH Construction will still be existence and a supplier of services to DCC.

We are at this time of year when we are well on the way to producing a budget, the increase will, unfortunately be 1.99% with an extra £17m funding being made available for Adult Care, because of funding short falls this current year, we are putting in an extra £17m. Remember, 1% increase in Council Tax, will only bring in £3.5m, well short of the £17m, so we will make further efficiency savings elsewhere. It will be difficult and it gets more difficult every year. We have always produced a balanced budget and we will do the same again. It is very much a time of holding our nerve. We have a good administration running County with a 47% reduction in staff and £244m reduction of income which has been cut from Government Grant. 8 years ago we would get 70% of our income from Government, now it is down to 40% and to go even lower, our choice is not to cut essential services.

At the same time, we have reduced our debt by  $\pounds106m$  from  $\pounds613m$  down to  $\pounds507m$ , We are business minded and will make tough choices to produce a balanced budget.

#### WILLAND HISTORY GROUP

First of all, we would like to thank everyone who responded to the request for information about Miss Rowbotham and Miss Partridge. Betty Penberthy remembers them well, particularly through their involvement with the Willand branch of the Women's Institute (which preceded the Willand CAMEO Club). She recalls that, "*Miss Rowbotham used to drive a very old vintage car … John Spearing bought the car when Miss Rowbotham no longer drove and it was on view at Spearings Garage. It was loaned to the WI when Devon Federation celebrated their 50th anniversary and several of us dressed up in 1920s clothes and drove down to Cullompton with John Spearing driving.*" With help from Peta Spearing, we think the vintage car was an Austin 7, and it was later sold to a man in Burlescombe. Geraldine 'Geri' Holloway has also been in touch to confirm that Miss Rowbotham did indeed live in part of Harpitt House. Geri also mentions how, "*My grandmother, Mrs Mary Ann Holloway, who lived with us at Carr Cottage was an ardent member of Willand Women's Institute and often spoke admiringly of Miss Partridge.*"

We recently received an enquiry from New Zealand from the descendents of William John Rees, who lived in Willand in the early 1900s, in Parkfield Terrace, Tiverton Junction; he worked at the Duchess of Devonshire Dairy and was the popular scoutmaster of Willand Scouts, William John Rees married Edith Lucy Fenwick at St Mary's Church on Christmas Day 1906. Amongst the gifts received was a tea service and cut glass sugar bowl from the team captain (Dr Tracey of The Gables) and members of Willand Football Club, which suggests that he also played football for Willand. In late 1910, along with his brother-inlaw Harry Fenwick, William John Rees emigrated to New Zealand, and they were joined the following year by his wife Edith and son Reginald William Rees. It seems that his father-in-law, Samuel Fenwick, (who had worked many years as a signalman on the railways and also lived on Parkfield Terrace) also headed off to New Zealand in 1911 and amongst the items auctioned off when he left were "well-made and useful antique and modern household furniture, American organ [and] bicycle." Do you have any information about the Rees of Fenwick families of Willand?

Towards the end of last year we received a query from the Devon historian, Todd Gray, who is researching the 'distinctiveness of Devon' and one of his themes is the names that Devonians gave to each other, particularly nicknames of villages and towns. A couple of examples he cites are that Cadeleigh used to get called 'Hens' and Chagford 'Chuggy Pigs'. Do you know if Willand ever had any nicknames? (And, yes, I know it has been called many things in recent times, and not always very flattering!) Or do you know of nicknames for any other location in the locality? Halberton or Uffculme, perhaps, or even the local conurbations of Cullompton or Tiverton? If you do, please let us know and we will pass it on for this county wide study.

Finally, a sad story from a hundred years ago has recently emerged – in March 1917, at a time when the First World War was still raging, Willand School had to be closed due to a measles epidemic. Measles were a serious matter in those days before a vaccine was introduced (in 1968) and tragically one Willand pupil, 11 year old Margaret Bristow from Stenhill, died. Her funeral was at Bradfield on Saturday, 3 March, and a wreath was sent by her teachers and school friends in Willand. Meanwhile, a hundred years ago, the community of Willand were doing their bit for the Home Front, with the Parish Council ordering six hundredweight (about 305kg) of seed potato to be grown in the parish as part of the national effort to counter food shortages. Closer to the action on the Western Front, in April 1917, Lieutenant Leonard Tracey, son of Dr Tracey – who had joined up in Willand in 1914 and later served in the Royal Field Artillery – was winning the Military Cross at Vimy Ridge "for conspicuous bravery in bringing in wounded under heavy shell fire."

# PRECEPT

Willand Parish Council are requesting a precept of £49,076 for 2017-2018. This is an increase of £2,089, or 3% on the 2016-2017 precept. It will increase the council tax on a band D house by approximately £1.32 for the year. The current charge for a band D house in Willand is £41.03. This compares with Uffculme at £70.75, Hemyock at £89.30.

The leases for the 3 play areas were finally signed in December and the ground maintenance costs are now established within the annual budget. The Parish Council are pleased to be able to develop the play facilities within Willand and are looking forward to adding new equipment during the coming years.

The Parish Council's policy is to increase the precept to slowly build up reserves for future projects such as the cemetery extension. The government grant that has been available to reduce the precept has been reduced this year by a further £345.

Is spring coming - seen Snowdrops, daffs and crocuses and just to muck things up some white stuff (Snowflakes) well that's our weather. Well as they say a dirty hoe is a happy hoe so high ho into the garden/allotment.

From this activity you will no doubt 'produce' some garden waste being the usual pruning's and clippings etc. If you bring your waste to the site - please be reminded that we only accept wood up to 1" diameter and fresh waste only.

Continuing with reminders - The site is:-

#### OPEN ON WEDNESDAYS AND SUNDAYS 10.00am - 12 Noon.

During these periods you can:-

- Deposit your garden waste please only bring the waste as shown on the signs we, would be grateful if you push back the waste into the bin with the fork provided. This assists the site being both tidy and safe for all.
- Purchase both Sieved and Unsieved compost. Sieved compost is £1.50/bag and Unsieved compost £1.00/wheelbarrow; if required use of wheelbarrows are located at the allotment side of the shed.
- From time to time we have a surplus of shredding material and at no cost. These (shreddings) are garden waste that has been shredded and periodically mixed with grass cuttings and mowed leaves.



#### WHAT IS A VETERINARY EMERGENCY?

Veterinary practices offer 24hr emergency service for their patients, but not all animal owners are aware of this. Sometimes they worry about calling in the middle of the night, or think the problem can be left until the morning. Although we don't have time to talk in depth about different emergencies, we will highlight common signs in which immediate veterinary attention should be sought:

 Male cats attempting to urinate but not able to pass any urine, or only small amounts. Although this may be a simple cystitis, some are prone to a blocked bladder, which can rapidly become a very serious condition.

- Some large breed dogs are prone to bloated stomachs (GDV). This often occurs after food or exercise. They quickly bloat, start retching, become subdued and can collapse. They need rapid treatment.
- Road traffic accidents are common in cats. Signs vary from scuffed nails, pain, difficulty breathing, bleeding and collapse. Animals should always be checked over as some injuries are not always initially apparent.
- Dogs often pant if hot or excited. If a dog is struggling to breathe or their gums are pale, blue or purple, they need treatment. If a cat pants or is making excessive effort to breathe it needs attention immediately. There are many reasons for this, such as asthma or heart failure but they all need immediate attention.
- Dogs, cats and rabbits may collapse for many different reasons. Any collapsed animal should be seen by a veterinary surgeon to assess the cause and give treatment as necessary.
- Superficial grazes, cuts and wounds that do not bleed or seem painful can be cleaned and dressed at home. If there is continued bleeding, discharge, pain or open wounds, the animal will need pain relief and further treatment.
- With the hotter weather coming, heatstroke becomes a real risk. Dogs left in cars, even for a few minutes, can develop heatstroke and die. They are also at risk if they over exercise in hot weather and do not drink enough. Be aware of excessive panting and increased body temperature.
- Dogs and cats frequently eat things they shouldn't. The common culprits are chocolate, raisins, lilies, rat bait, slug bait, antifreeze, permethrin (found in some flea products) in cats and human medications such as ibuprofen. If you suspect any of these, call a vet immediately.

This is not an exhaustive list but may give you food for thought when worrying whether to call a vet or not. Sometimes a phone call and peace of mind may be all you need!
